DEDICATE LUTHERAN SECTION OF CEMETERY

North Shore Cemetery Plans Formal Dedication Next Sunday

About a year ago an agreement was made between the Lutheran churches in Lake County and the North Shore Cemetery to set aside a certain section of that cemetery to be known as the Lutheran Section. In this project Park as well as the one in Highwood the Lutheran church of Highland became interested.

Dating back to the earliest settlements of Lutherans in America there has always been an intimate connection between the church and the cemetery. Throughout our country wherever a Lutheran church was built a cemetery was laid out beside it, or a group of congregations built their own cemetery. Basing upon this tradition the Lutherans of this county, being of English, German, Swedish, Norwegian, Finnish and Lithuanian extraction, have united in this project.

North Shore Cemetery was selected, because among all the cemeteries of the county it is ranked as the best. Under the direction of Mr. Western it has become a beauty spot along the North Shore; not a graveyard but an ideal resting place.

The number of lots specified in the contract have been sold, and accordingly the section has been laid out, and is now fully completed with trees and shrubs.

The formal dedication of this section will take place on Sunday afternoon at 3:30. A program appropriate to the occasion has been worked out. The general public is of course invited to attend this dedication.

ONE KILLED, FOUR HURT IN AUTOMOBILE CRASH

Frank Campbell of Glencoe Is Victim of Accident Sunday on Dundee Road

Four were injured, one fatally when an automobile driven by Frank Campbell, Jr., aged 21 years, of Glencoe turned over on the Dundee road between Glencoe and Northbrook, at 11 o'clock Sunday morning.

Frank Campbell, Sr., aged 65 years, also of Glencoe and father of the driver of the machine, was the one fatally hurt. He died in the Highland Park hospital at 2:45 o'clock Sunday afternoon. He was badly crushed when he was pinioned beneath the machine which overturned.

His son received a broken arm while two other companions received severe cuts and bruises.

James Nielsen, 926 Logan street, suffered a fracture of the wrist and is still unconscious in the Highland Park hospital after colliding with Matt Dewey, Highland Park, Monday. Nielsen had come out from under a viaduct at Waukegan and Bloom streets.

Fred Costelli, a lad riding a bicycle, and Hector Maechtle, riding on the handle bars, suffered slight injuries Saturday night when their bike was struck by an auto driven by George Borncamp, Townline road, Highland Park. Maechtle was injured and was attended by Dr. Rogers.

A Chevrolet car, driven by Peter Piacenza, 577 Glenview avenue, was badly damaged Saturday night at Sheridan and Roger Williams avenue, when it was struck by a car driven by John Wentworth of Chicago. Piacenza and two companions escaped serious injury.

NORTH SHORE LINE SERVICE TO RAVINIA

Special Accommodations Provided for Opera Season by Railway

The Chicago North Shore and Milwaukee Railroad (North Shore line) will furnish convenient service for music lovers of Milwaukee, Racine, Kenosha, Waukegan and other North Shore communities directly to the gates of Ravinia Park during the summer outdoor opera season, starting next Saturday, June 23.

For the convenience of residents in Waukegan and communities south of that city, all regular half-hourly southbound Waukegan limiteds will stop at Ravinia Park, daily except Thursday and Sunday, beginning with the train leaving downtown Waukegan at 6 p. m. (daylight saving time). On Thursdays and Sundays all southbound Waukegan limiteds will stop at Ravinia Park, beginning with the train leaving downtown Waukegan at 1 p. m., (daylight saving time) and continuing through the evening.

Immediately after the performance each evening during the opera season, a special northbound train will leave Ravinia Park, proceeding as far north as traffic requires. Northbound Waukegan limiteds also will make the Ravinia Park stop during the evenings.

FLASH MOTION PICTURE BY WIRE FROM CHICAGO

Movies of Screen Star Sent by Telegraph to New York Recently

Seven hours after Miss Vilma Banky, film star, stood before the motion camera in Chicago, the motion pictures taken in Chicago were flashed on a theatre screen in New York. This feat—accomplished recently—was made possible by the use of the telephoto. It was the first time that motion pictures have been sent over a wire.

The film of Miss Banky was cut into short strips, which were pasted on glass plates, and in this form transmitted to New York via telephoto—the development which makes possible sending pictures over telephone wires. In the east the pictures received were joined into a continuous strip for the movie projector. Transmitting the film required two hours.
