DIGNITY OF BUSINESS IS TOPIC OF SPEECH

Judge Parker at Annual Session of National C. of C., Urges Integrity

The leading business men of the nation have been gathered in the National Capital for the Sixteenth Annual Meeting of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. Every phase of business, finance and industry has been intelligently discussed. Our national leaders favor big business, better business — and more of it.

Judge Parker made what a political convention would term a "keynote speech." He declared that unless business purges itself of those "whose acts stigmatize and bring business generally into disrepute," the public will turn loose "thunderbolts of wrath" which will inevitably bring legislative and governmental regulation of business and hamper freedom of the initiative. Stockholders of corporations, he said, have the duty of publicly repudiating those who misrepresent them by amazing profits through corruption.

Big business men applaud this kind of doctrine nowadays. The industrial leaders of the nation find that they get along first rate with the Government, and their Washington gatherings have resulted in business and Government getting together along lines intended to bring "the greatest good for the greatest number" of people.
