Judge Parker at Annual Session of National C. of C., **Urges Integrity**

Judge Parker made what a political convention would term a "keynote speech." He declared that unless business purges itself of those "whose acts stigmatize and bring business generally into disrepute," the public will turn loose "thunderbolts of wrath" which will inevitably bring legislative and governmental reglation of buisness and hamper freedom of the inftiative. Stockholders of corporations, he said, have the duty of publicly repudiating those who misrepresent them by amazing profits through corruption.
