Have just sent coupon to City Clerk re ornamental lighting for whole city.

Wouldn't it be a good plan to start a similar movement for sidewalks on at least one side of Sheridan road between Deer Park and the County Line road and new sidewalks on the north side of County Line road from Sheridan road to the Braeside Station?

My neighbors and I find it positively dangerous to walk on the roadway at night or even in the daytime on account of traffic conditions. In the winter time when there is snow or ice on the roadway it is even worse.

I believe it to be the duty of the city to safeguard its citizens in every way possible. The old method of securing signatures to petitions is too slow and uncertain.

Safety of pedestrians should be the first consideration and therefore the city should take the initiative—instead of depending upon property owners to apply by petition.
