Her first appearance was in her own home town of Evanston when she was four years old. Ever since she can remember she wanted to go on the stage. Her family made one stipulation, that she finish school and keep up with her dancing if she wished during that period.

As soon as she had finished school Dorothy found her way into the "Greenwich Village Follies" as a dancer. She had realized her desire to play on Broadway, the land of her childhood dreams.

Then she came home for a vacation and by a trick of fate the part of Betty Ford in "Excess Baggage" was offered her. While it is an acting part, it is also the role of a young girl who is a dancer on the stage and because of dancing Dorothy was able to fill the role.

Now she is having the fun of living at home in Evanston and playing in Chicago, an opportunity given to few actresses outside of New York.

"My choice in choosing the kind of a career on the stage," says Dorothy, "would be as an actress in spite of my long training in dancing, but the dancing has been a real stepping stone to the parts that I should like to play.
