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NO FUND FOR WIDE ROADS IN COUNTY

MUST DEPEND ON STATE

No Money Here to Carry on Plan Being Made in Cook County and Wisconsin for Super Highways

It appears that Lake county will be bottled in between the widened boulevards of Cook county and of Wisconsin. County Highway Superintendent R. M. Lobdell said last week that it may be many years before Lake county can widen roads to the extent planned by Cook county and the state of Wisconsin because it would cost a fortune to get the needed right-of-way in Lake county and that, of course, the paving cost would also be heavy. "The state rather than counties are handling this road improvement in Wisconsin. Cook county too, has money to use for practically every purpose," said Mr. Lobdell. "One thing is certain and that is that Lake county at this time is not in the financial position to go ahead with the big road widening program."

Wisconsin Progress
President Charles M. Hayes of the Chicago Motor club was assured at a meeting in Milwaukee by officials of Wisconsin that the Wisconsin end of U. H. highway 41, which is to be made into a 40-foot boulevard, will be completed in time to meet similar development in Chicago.

At the meeting were officials of the Wisconsin highway administration, Mayor Daniel Hoan of Milwaukee, and Chairman William McCarthy of the county board and representatives of the leading civic and business organizations of Milwaukee.

"We have decided that four lane roads are the main essentials in the development of motor facilities," Mr. McCarthy told the gathering, "and here in Milwaukee county we have adopted a policy of widening radial roads instead of building more and more narrow connecting highways."

Lake Shore Boulevard
Mayor Hoan said that Milwaukee further is prepared to build the northern end of a boulevard to extend along the lake shore from Milwaukee to Chicago within the next decade.

William Kavanaugh, Milwaukee county highway engineer, said that within three weeks appraisers for right-of-way will be out preparing for the 40 foot widening for highway 41 in Milwaukee county.

"Kenosha county is now engaged in getting its right of way along the line, and we expect that Racine county will join forces within a few weeks," he said. "That will assure the widening to the Illinois line and it will then be up to Illinois to get action."

TRUDE MAY BE NEXT FEDERAL COURT JUDGE

While friends of Municipal Judge Daniel P. Trude continue to boom him as successor to the late Federal Judge Adam C. Edwards, now sitting in the Seventeenth Judicial District Circuit court, and Attorney Ninian Welch of Chicago, master-in-chancery.

COUNTY MOTOR COP TO WAR ON SPEEDERS

Law violating motorists beware! A campaign will be started on Saturday by Sheriff Lawrence A. Doolittle against fast drivers, reckless drivers, and those operating motor vehicles while under the influence of liquor. The drive will continue for the next four months. The primary purpose is to reduce automobile accidents in Lake county and thus save persons from being killed or injured.

Doolittle Thursday announced the appointment of four officers who are to ride motorcycles for the next four months. He already has two motorcycle officers. The new men are to start work on Saturday.

The motorcycles purchased for the sheriff's office arrived Wednesday and are now being "broken in" by the deputies appointed to ride them. The new appointees follow:

Acting Commander Since Departure of Ziegemeier for New Post

Post of commandant of the Great Lakes Naval Training station and the ninth naval district is now being filled by Capt. G. L. P. Stone, who assumed the position on the departure of Rear Admiral H. J. Ziegemeier for Seattle, Wash., where he will assume command of the Bremerton navy yard.

The command of Captain Stone is but temporary, however, as an appointment to the post will be announced in Washington within the next few weeks, it is stated. During the interim Captain Stone will have complete charge of all affairs at the station and in the naval district.

Captain Stone served as assistant commandant during the incumbency of Rear Admiral Ziegemeier as commander.

TO DEVELOP MERCURY FIELD, NORTH CHICAGO

Pioneers in Discovery Secure More Land and Hope to Mine Ore Soon

The testing of and mining for mercury in North Chicago will be carried on slowly on account of the great cost which the work involves and the danger of land shark activities, promotion schemes and get-rich-quick propositions, E. J. Neary, one of the discoverers of the mercury, stated last week when asked what procedure would be taken in mining for the ore. Neary and his co-discoverer, H. J. Annis, are positive from tests that the mercury is there and will arrange to locate the mercury pocket.

Land values continue to rise and it is impossible to purchase property in the vicinity of the discovery. Neary and Annis purchased more land several days ago and now have more than twenty lots in the neighborhood of Kristan avenue and Twenty-second. Wm. Fulton, Sr., Waukegan real estate dealer, is holding a large block of lots pending further investigation.

TWO KILLED WHEN TRUCK HITS TRAIN

CROSSING CRASH IN FOG

Fatal Accident Occurs Near Libertyville Last Thursday; Chicago Men Victims; Truck Burned

Two more lives were claimed last Thursday morning by the Elgin Joliet and Eastern railway grade crossing on Milwaukee avenue south of Libertyville when two Chicago men met death there when their truck crashed into a moving train and was demolished. The dead men are:

Tony Saltaris, 28, single, 327 Alexandria avenue, Chicago, and John Rustman, 35 years old, married and the father of two children. Rustman was killed outright, his skull being split in two when thrown from the machine in the crash. Saltaris died two hours later in the Elizabeth Conde Memorial hospital as the result of burns received when the wrecked machine took fire following the accident.

Early in Morning
The accident occurred shortly after five o'clock Thursday morning when the two men were returning to Chicago after making their regular trip up the north shore and through the lake region where they deliver bread to the branches of the Atlantic and Pacific Tea store.

The truck is owned by the Keshian Motor express and Rustman was employed by that firm as a driver and Saltaris as helper.

Wednesday evening the two men left Chicago with a load of bread which they delivered at the stores along the route, making the last stop at Libertyville where they completed their work shortly after five o'clock and started south on Milwaukee avenue.

It is thought that the driver was not aware of his approach to the railroad crossing because of the heavy fog and the big truck crashed into the locomotive without slackening its speed. The impact was so great that the fireman of the railroad engine was thrown from the cab.

Truck Burned
The truck was thrown to the east of the pavement and parts of the front end were strewn along the railroad right-of-way. The gas tank must have exploded in the first crash as both men were drenched with burning oil when they were thrown from the wreckage. The truck was badly damaged by fire.

WOMAN KILLED AND SEVERAL INJURED

Automobile Wreck Near State Line Last Week Results Disastrously

One woman was fatally injured, a young boy so seriously hurt that he died later in the Lake County hospital and four others, two children, a woman and a man, sustained injuries of a less serious nature when an automobile in which they were riding went off the pavement in Green Bay road, north of Waukegan, last week, skidded into a ditch, crashed against a telephone pole and overturned. The accident occurred at nine-thirty-five o'clock about a half mile south of the state line.

Mrs. Mary Walker, a middle aged woman, 6824 Twenty-fourth avenue, Kenosha, died at the Victory Memorial hospital shortly afterward from injuries suffered in the accident. She was internally injured and had a skull fracture. It was realized from the outset that her condition was hopeless.

HIGHWOOD EMPLOYE OF N. S. LINE IS KILLED

A. Laufenberg, 26, of Highwood, died at noon last Thursday in the Evanston hospital where he was taken suffering from a skull fracture he received while on duty on his North Shore line run between Waukegan and Evanston.

Laufenberg, brakeman on a north bound train, had walked down the steps as he neared Cherry street, Winnetka. He leaned out and looked back. As he did this he was struck by a post the car passed.

Laufenberg was placed in an ambulance and rushed to the Evanston hospital. The deceased had been employed by the North Shore line for several years. His first position had been on the city lines in Waukegan and it was but two months ago that he moved to Highwood to make his home. Up until that time he was employed daily on the Waukegan city line. He, and his widow and small child, decided to make their residence in Highwood after he got on a main-line run.
