



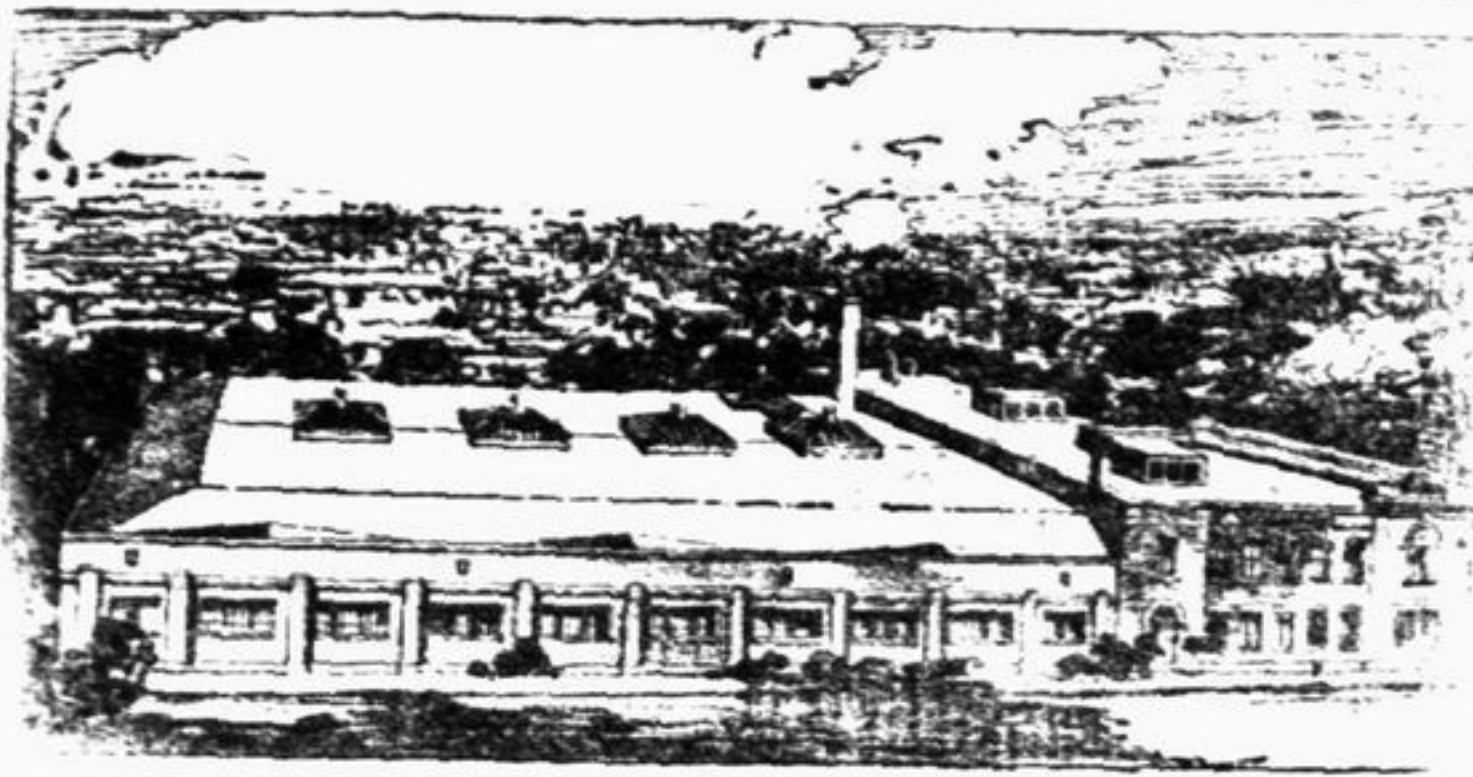

Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor club, "but it remains for staid, dignified, conservative England to approach the problem on the basis of chivalry. "Some time ago the motor club asked for letters from motorists who had driven 10,000 miles or more without an accident, and received hundreds of letters from motorists who had driven ten, twenty, fifty, and even a hundred thousand miles without an accident of any kind. The volume of letters that poured into the club in response to this request shows that motorists have a great amount of pride in being able to drive without even having a scratched fender. The large number of those who had driven great distances without accident of any kind indicates that the old desire to be known as a speed artist, which was manifested in the early days of motoring, has been supplanted by the desire to be known as a good driver, and a motorist who never has accidents," declares Mr. Hayes.
