Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore and Vicinity; County Seat Doings

Waukegan merchants went on the Wednesday half-holiday plan Wednesday, July 4, according to the chamber of commerce of that town.

The North Shore Sanitary district's new sewage disposal plant at North Chicago was put into operation Saturday afternoon at 2:30, and the engineers in charge of the construction of the plant held "open house."

The primary date of July 24 for the nominating of a city judge for Zion and the election date of August 21 was fixed Monday night by the Zion council. Attorney Theodore Forby, general counsel of the city, is to be the choice of the Voliva faction, it is said.

Ralph Chittenden, 70 years old and a veteran resident of Gurnee, was rushed to the Lake county general hospital Friday morning suffering from second degree burns when gasoline mixed with kerosene exploded as he poured it on a fire in an attempt to hurry up the blaze.

A mad dog, foaming at the mouth and frightening patrons of the North Shore Line, was shot by the North Chicago police last week.

Members of the Waukegan Tax-payers' association in closed meeting last week, decided to raise a fund of \$5,000 for the purpose of delving into city and county expenditures and submitting them to the public in pamphlet form.

James Gavigan, popular sixteen year old Gurnee high school student, was drowned in the Gurnee gravel pit last week when seized with cramps or a heart attack as he reached the middle of the deep pond in his attempt to swim to the other side.

Belated for the matter of a year or so, the shield marker of the federal highway through routes are gradually being put into place by the state highway department.

WILL SEND GIFTS TO MEXICAN CHILDREN

To inculcate world friendship among children, a good will project between the children of America and the children of Mexico, also to cultivate understanding of the interests of each country, two beautiful fabrikoid brief cases will be packed by the Junior department of the Deerfield Presbyterian church school and one by the Primary department. Each bag will contain ten articles to be selected from the following lists. For a boy: top, colored pencils, drinking cup (folding), cardboard village, handkerchiefs, drawing set, transfer pictures, ball, games, scrapbooks, soap models, writing material, tooth brush and paste, compass, small box of paints, cardboard zoo, glass marbles, whistle, magnet, postage stamps for collection, harmonica, puzzles and puzzle pictures. For the girls a tiny doll, hair ribbon, jumping rope, jacks, sewing kit, small mirror in case, games, crochet and knitting needles, transfer pictures, etc. Things not desired are candy, food, liquids, matches, firecrackers, pocket-knives, anything celluloid, anything easily breakable nor anything ugly.

The committee will provide pictures of both American and Mexican heroes, a personal friendly letter of greeting to each child; a self addressed stamped envelope for the "Thank You" letter; one or more packets of seeds, because of the great interest shown in school gardens in Mexico. These varieties can be grown anywhere in Mexico, portulaca, zinnia, petunia, cosmos, lettuce, beets.

Tens of thousand of American children will be educated in international thinking and good will toward Mexico. All articles must be in by August first in order to reach Mexico on their day of independence which is September 16. Mexico became independent in 1810.

GENERAL MALONE GETS PROMOTION LAST WEEK

ANNUAL HORSE SHOW AT FORT SHERIDAN

TO BE HELD JULY 13-14

Two-Day Program Well Rounded and Many Interesting Features Promised; Famous Judges Preside

The fourth annual Fort Sheridan Horse Show, calling for morning and afternoon sessions, will be held in the outdoor ring here on Friday and Saturday, July 13th and 14th, 1928. Thirty-four classes are included in the prize lists, which, excepting cash awards for the two sweepstakes, will consist entirely of plate amounting to over three thousand dollars. The proceeds of the show, for which more than fifty socially prominent women are patronesses, will go to the benefit of the Army Relief society and to the fund for the education of Post children.

The two-day program is well rounded, giving many opportunities for exhibitors in the various divisions. In addition, there will be several distinct military features including Roman riding and a musical ride by the personnel of the 14th Cavalry.

Among the various classes listed are nine pertaining to military personnel, including one jumping class for reserve officers on government owned mounts. Two classes are scheduled for children under fourteen. The hunters and jumpers have been allotted fourteen classes covering practically all angles of the division. Among the features will be the always brilliant Olympia jumps, a figure eight combination in which performance only counts. Other classes for the hunters and jumpers include the familiar touch-and-out; two sweepstakes, one for amateurs only; and the usual hunter championship for the blue ribbon winners. Seven classes are scheduled in the saddle horse division, and two in the polo pony class.

Mr. Walter Palmer, of Detroit, and Mr. A. S. Thompson, of Paducah, Kentucky, two of the country's outstanding horsemen, will judge the various classes of the saddle horse division. Lieutenant Colonels George T. Langborne and Ben Lear, Jr., both cavalry, United States army, will judge all military classes.

Entries close July 3, Lieutenant Wilmer G. Bennett, aid to Major General Paul B. Malone, commanding the Sixth Corps area, is secretary of the Horse Show committee. Forms and information may be procured by addressing him at Fort Sheridan, Ill.

CIVIL LEGION MEMBERS ATTEND NOTIFICATIONS

Committees to Represent This Organization; Several Members in County

MAN HELD IN BECK MURDER HAS RECORD

John Brown, colored, 40, of 3652 Indiana avenue, Chicago, one of the men arrested in connection with the murder of William Beck, Jr., at Milburn several weeks ago, was convicted in Lake county on a charge of larceny several years ago and sentenced to serve an indeterminate term of from one to ten years in Joliet penitentiary, it was learned last week. He went to prison in December of 1920. The case was one of the first prosecuted by State's Attorney Smith.

Claude Clark, colored, 41, a Chicagoan, who is alleged to have fired the shot which fatally injured Beck, and who is still a fugitive from justice, has a lengthy criminal record. Col. Smith has been informed by the identification bureau of the City of Chicago. He has served sentences in Joliet penitentiary, Pontiac reformatory, the House of Correction in Chicago and the Cook county jail. He was convicted on burglary, robbery, larceny, assault with intent to commit robbery, and disorderly conduct charges.

GLENCOE NOW CLAIMS POPULATION OF 6,000

Glencoe's population is now approximately 6,000, according to an official estimate made this week from figures compiled by Norman E. Watson, assistant superintendent of the Glencoe public schools, who has been taking the school census during the last three weeks.

The area included in the census was school district number thirty-five, which does not include a small southeast portion of the village bordered by Jackson and Woodlawn avenues on the north, Lake avenue on the west, the Winnetka limits on the south, and Lake Michigan on the east. This southeast portion of Glencoe is included in the Winnetka school district.

Total population figures for the greater Glencoe area included in the census taken by Mr. Watson this year were 5,489, an increase of 947 over the 1923 figure. The population of the village has been increasing steadily during the last six years.

GLENCOE BARS SALE, USE OF FIREWORKS

President W. D. Gerber of Glencoe, announced last week that he had, of late, received a number of calls regarding the use of explosive fireworks in the village.

"The sale, purchase and use of such explosive fireworks is prohibited by village ordinance," President Gerber declared, and added, "it is hoped the parents of children will co-operate in bringing about observance of this provision."
