Dr. Albertus A. Pfanstichl was born at Holland, Michigan, on November 14, 1855. He was the seventeenth child of his parents and the first white child bern in that Dutch colony. His father and mother had emigrated from the homeland a few years before, giving up an assured. position of wealth and influence to thrust in their lot with those who Holland of the Old World there was enacted in the early decades of the last century very much the same Open are as follows: struggle for independence of thought and action that we associate with the movement of the Pilgrim Fathers in England two centuries before. That was Dr. Pfanstiehl's heritage and he gloried in it. His father was the financial mainstay of the small group who founded the now prosperous city of Holland, Michigan. The hardships of these pioneers in the beginnings of this enterprise were almost incredible. At one period malarial fever swept the colony and scores perished. 
