MEDAL OF HONOR**

Tuition for Two Years at University of Chicago Awarded Local Boy

These honor scholarships, which are being offered this year for the first time, require that the candidate be of distinctive rank in leadership and personality as well as in scholarship. Recommendations from alumni of the university as well as from the school authorities are a determining factor in the selection of the young men.

Mr. McGath, in addition to paying all his own expenses during his high school course and saving a considerable sum toward college, ranked ninth in his class in scholarship and played with distinction on the basketball, baseball, and golf teams of the school. He was chosen president of his class in both his sophomore and senior years, and served continuously on the student council.

Sixteen scholarships were offered for which more than a hundred young men made application.
