GEO. W. ROSSETTER BUYS 40 ACRE TRACT

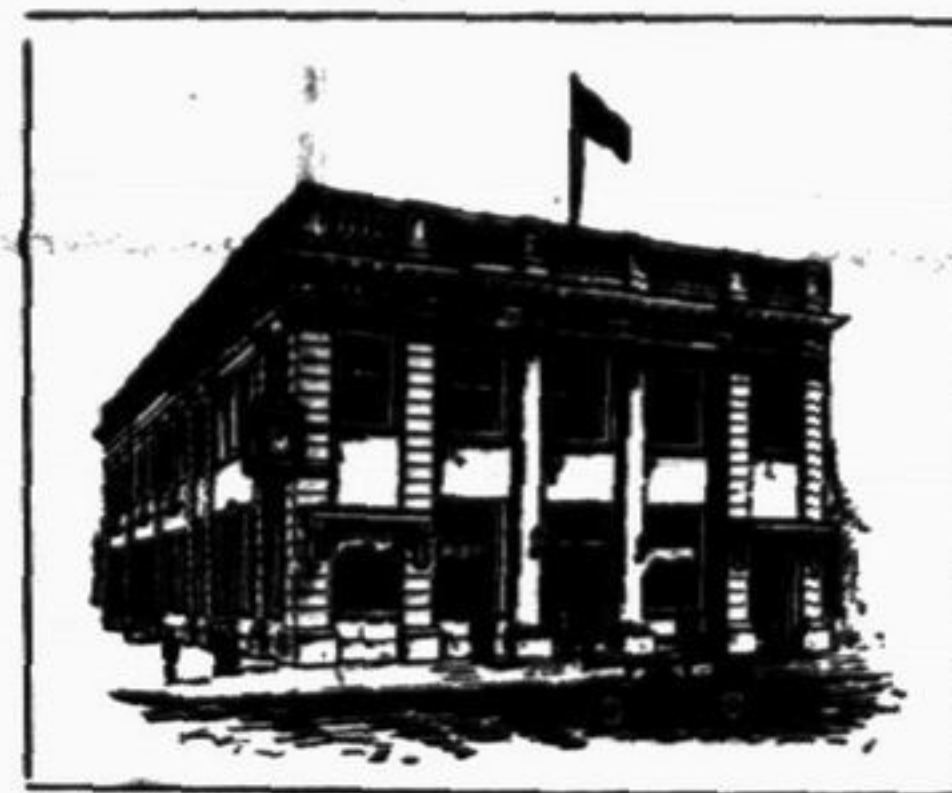
