Interesting Happenings About This Part of North Shore and Vicinity; County Seat Doings

The annual Des Plaines camp meeting opened last week and will continue until July 15th.

Thomas Twentyman, Sr., veteran bricklayer and a resident of Waukegan for years, died at his home at 700 Belvidere street last Thursday night after a short illness.

Miles Greenwood Nixon, student, inventor and manufacturer who lived in Waukegan 25 years, died last week at Bridgeton, N. J., after having been in poor health for many months.

Barney Lohfing, 45, of 1524 Laurel Avenue, Waukegan, was drowned last week in Des Plaines river, just north of Gurnee, where he and another person had gone to spend the day.

BOY DROWNED WHILE BATHING AT WAUKEGAN

Slipping from a raft on which he and three other youths were playing, Eddie Grahek, aged about 12 years, sank to his death in a hole on the north beach off of the site of the new Waukegan waterworks at 11:30 Friday morning.

Although the body was taken from the water within twenty minutes after he had gone down all efforts to revive the youth were of no avail.

Mike Butkus, 726 Eight street, an employe of the Public Service company and who with three fellow workmen were employed nearby almost lost his life in the attempt to save the drowning boy.

LAKE COUNTY HAS 40 BOYS FOR CAMP

C. M. T. C., FT. SHERIDAN

Begins Friday, July 27; Most of the Applicants Are From Waukegan; Room For Few More

Forty Lake county boys, the majority of them from Waukegan, have had their applications accepted and will enter the Citizens' Military Training Camp at Fort Sheridan, which opens July 27.

The quota set for Lake county is thirty boys and for the present camp and that held last summer, Waukegan sent forty boys over to take the training. Many of those who went last year are back for more this season.

Rev. N. A. Borop, chairman of the C. M. T. C. arrangements at Waukegan last year and appointed to that position again this year, announced Saturday that while Lake county is over quota, a few more youths may be accepted from here on the Chicago quota if they get in touch with either Rev. Borop or Capt. P. J. Lloyd. Capt. Lloyd is at the camp during the day working on the C. M. T. C. arrangements, but is at home

after 8 o'clock in the evening. Application forms may be obtained from either Rev. Borop or Capt. Lloyd.

Only men between 17 and 24 years old of good character will be accepted. If their credentials are approved and they can pass the physical examinations, nothing further is necessary. The camp lasts a month and business houses in the city have been asked to grant employes attending it vacations with pay.

SAFETY PLANS FOR BAD CROSSING CONSIDERED

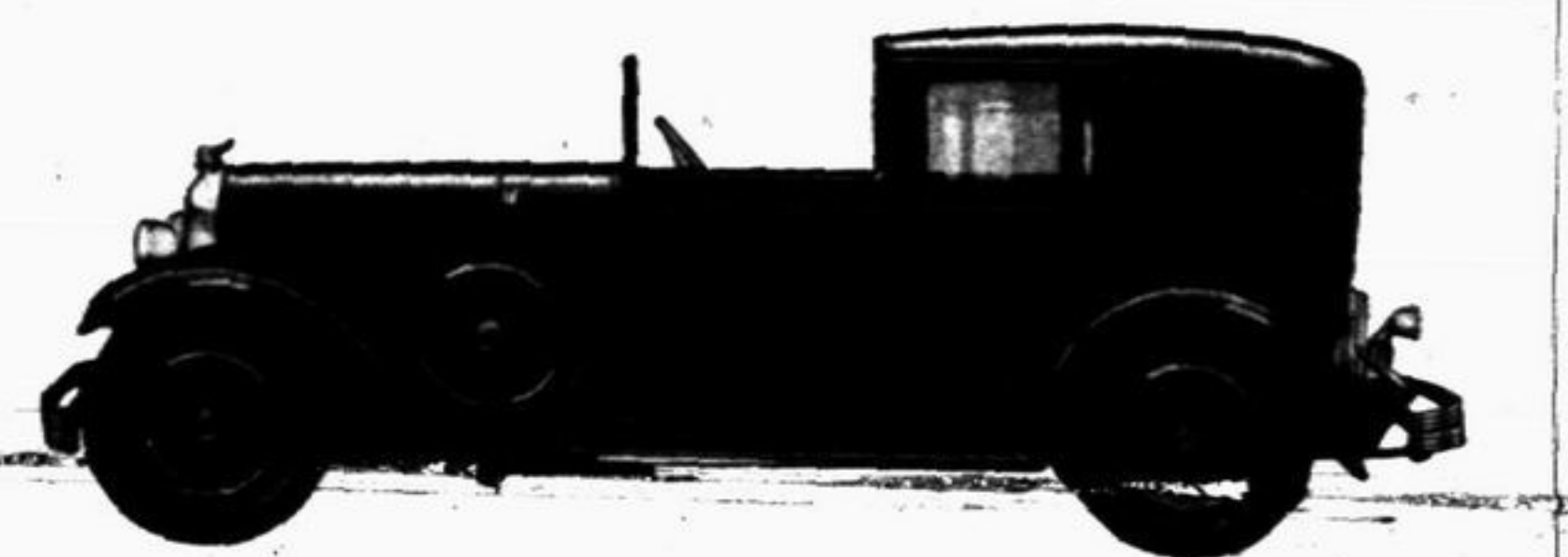
A representative of the Illinois Commerce commission last week conferred with Coroner John L. Taylor concerning installation of gates and a watchman at "death crossing," located on the E. J. and E. line, three miles south of Libertyville.

The commission representative made a personal inspection of the hazardous crossing that afternoon. It was stated that the installation of double automatic electric signal lights is being considered.

The interest of the Commerce Commission is the result of a letter sent and signed by members of a coroner's jury composed of prominent Libertyville men, demanding that proper protection be given motorists at the crossing. The jury investigated the deaths of John Rustman and Tony Saltoris, Chicago men, who were killed last week when their truck crashed into the side of a "J" engine.

RECOMMENDATION The Board of Local Improvements of the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, herewith transmits to your Honorable Body a draft of an ordinance...

SECTION 1. That a local improvement be and the same is hereby ordered, made in the City of Highland Park, Lake County, Illinois, the nature, character, location and description of which is as follows to-wit:

That a reinforced concrete pavement with combined curb and gutter and the necessary drainage be constructed in the following streets: IN ARBOR AVENUE from and connecting with the hereinafter described concrete pavement in said Arbor Avenue...

IN FERRDALE AVENUE from and connecting with the hereinafter described concrete pavement in said Ferrdale Avenue from and connecting with the hereinafter described concrete pavement in said Ferrdale Avenue...
