One of the ordinance provisions involved was a regulation which, according to contentions of counsel for the village of Lake Bluff, had the effect of restricting apartment construction to fourteen families to the acre. The Lake Bluff village board Monday evening voted to appeal the case to a higher court.

### TO INSPECT MEAT PLANTS IN STATE

THOSE NOT REGULATED

Department to Cover Them As Well As Those Having Interstate Business; to Protect Meat Users

State meat inspection at packing plants in Illinois that are not regulated by the United States government is now underway as an added service of the Illinois department of agriculture, according to an announcement issued by Stillman J. Stanard, director of agriculture. He states the object of this added service of the department he directs as follows:

"Greater protection to the meat consuming public of Illinois is the object of this inspection service. This is to be provided through the condemnation of diseased or injured animals and the rejection of all carcasses found unfit for human food. Packing houses that seek and are subjected to state regulations must maintain strictly sanitary conditions. Employees handling meat in such establishments must meet certain health requirements. The result will be more wholesome meat, and the elimination of packing house products sold as food in which there may be filth and disease."

### Business in State

"There are, in Illinois, many packing plants that confine their trade within the state. The federal government extends its meat inspection only to concerns that do inter-state business. The small concerns and consumers of their products have been without this supervision and protection. The public has learned to rely upon the stamp that means the meat thus branded is free from disease or other objectionable features."

"It is our policy, in all branches of this department, to provide for the smaller concerns and for individuals, the same benefits that the larger industries enjoy. Consumers of the meat that comes from the smaller packing houses are entitled to the same protection that our national government gives the public that consumes the meat the big concerns produce. That, briefly, is why the Illinois department of agriculture makes this service available to the plants applying for it that operate in Illinois, supplying food for Illinois consumers."

Regulations, issued by the state department of agriculture, outline rules for the inspection, before and after killing, of all animals slaughtered in the packing plants that obtain this service. Veterinarians, accredited as qualified for this exacting service by the Illinois department of agriculture and by the bureau of animal industry of the United States, will serve as packing house inspectors at the request and expense of the packers. The meat they pass upon will be branded "I D A Passed," if fit for food. Carcasses condemned will be immediately rendered inedible, converted into other products or destroyed.

Sanitation rules are embodied in the order. It also includes the requirement that employees handling meat must qualify as free from infectious or communicable diseases.
