While other men choose golf, swimming, curios, porcelains, paintings as their hobbies, Eugene Wright, who has ranged over most every section of the

ing information on kinds and varieties of hot weather. Thus when the warm waves strike different sections of the United States persons living in any given section, can, by consulting Wright's data on kinds of heats found in different parts of the world, published in the July American Magazine, find many other places where the weather is more unkind than it is in their particular locality. Humid heat, beating heat of the sun, dry heat, equatorial heat, water heat and even cold heat are among those discussed by Wright. The heat of the Death Valley, on the Pacific coast, he characterizes as rising in billows and being of the extremely dry variety. The hottest five days spent on a boat trip through the Red Sea, this being the sort produced by the beating rays of the sun in a locality where there was no wind. There is no weather hotter in my experience," he says, "than that which I found it

on the top of the snow covered Rockies in August. My nose burned with cold and I had to rub it vigorously to keep it from freezing. And then the sun came out. The sun roasted my back, but I dared not remove my heavy shirt because of the cold. I sweated copiously only to be severely chilled the moment I turned to warm my face. That was heat with a vengeance."
