### RAILROADS EXPECT BIG CROP MOVEMENT

#### PREPARE FOR TRANSPORT

#### Extensive Plans Being Made by Carriers to Handle Exceptionally Heavy Traffic, Report

Announcement that the railroads of the United States are preparing to handle an exceptionally heavy movement of crops this year, and that arrangements are progressing rapidly for the acquisition of property of the American Railway Express Company by the carriers, was made at a meeting of the executive committee of the Association of Railway Executives just held here. The next meeting of the board will be held in Montreal early this fall. The exact date will be determined later, according to Christian Science Monitor.

Under uniform contracts the carriers may acquire the property of the express company on the railroad lines at "cost, less depreciation," on Feb. 1, 1929. Mr. Storey's committee also will negotiate with the express company for the acquisition of property not located on the railroad lines. The express company, according to the committee's report, does an annual business of approximately \$300,000,000.

#### Heavy Crop Movement

The heavy crop movement during the late summer and fall will be due largely to increased concentration of harvester-thresher machines and "possible favorable market prices," according to a report presented to the meeting.

"Winter crops conditions this year," the report said, "are different from usual. The area of so called soft winter wheat production, extending from Missouri east and north of the Ohio River has suffered very heavy abandonment and present prospects indicate only about half the crop of last year.

"From the middle of Kansas south, the area of heaviest production, an increase of about 35 per cent is indicated, while north and west of the middle of Kansas the prospects are less favorable. These conditions will concentrate the heavy crop movement within a limited area. The necessary action to build up the box car supply of the southwestern lines is accordingly being taken."

Loading of revenue freight for the first 22 weeks of this year totaled 20,468,015 cars, a decrease of 958,881 cars as compared with a corresponding period in 1927, it was reported. Production of bituminous coal, according to the report, for the calendar year to May 12, totaled 176,752,000 tons, a decrease of 42,260,000 tons for the same period of 1927.

#### MINIMUM SPELLING TEST IN N. Y. SCHOOLS

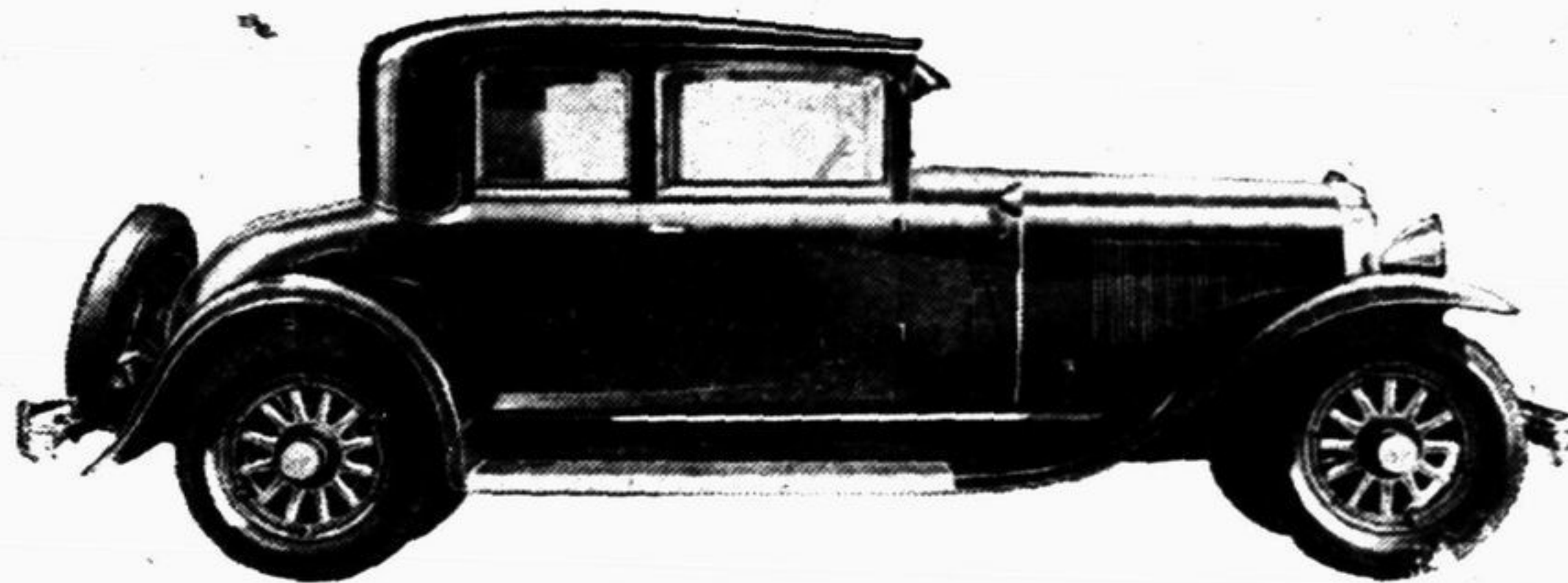
