Cost \$250,000 "As payment for the Bright Angel trail, the United States, through the Secretary of the Interior, as authorized by act of Congress approved June 5, 1924, has allotted the sum of \$250,000 for the construction and improvement of the Grand Canyon highway from the National Old Trails highway through Coconino county to the boundary of the Grand Canyon National Park."

COURT DECISION IN FAVOR OF SALESMAN

Merely because there is a court record to the effect that a purchaser of an automobile has been found guilty of a violation of the prohibition law, the seller of an automobile is not chargeable with knowledge of that fact in making a sale to such a person, according to the legal department of the American Motorists' association quoting a decision of the Fourth Circuit Court of Appeals.

In a case where the purchaser has been convicted, the lower court held the government had a right to seize the car. The higher court reversed the decision, holding that the seller had a right to show that his lien was a bona fide one.

Dog Left \$5,000 Grigorette, a New Orleans canine, has been left \$5,000 under the terms of the will of his mistress, Mrs. Mary L. M. Schaffter. The dog is to reap the benefit of \$2,000 in cash and an income from and additional \$3,000.

HUGE TOTAL OF DEATHS ATTRIBUTED TO AUTOS

A total of 7,206 deaths attributable to automobile accidents were reported during the 52-week period ending May 19, 1928, in the 77 largest cities of the country, according to figures compiled by The Automobile club of Illinois. During the corresponding period ending May 23, 1927, the total deaths, due to automobiles in the same 77 cities, aggregated 6,901. This represents an increase of 3 per cent in deaths from automobiles during the year in the 77 cities, the ratio for the current year being 22.4 deaths per 100,000 as against 21.8 per 100,000 the previous year.

O—How does Illinois rank in farm-owned motor vehicles? —P.H., Champaign.

A—Only Texas has more farm-owned motor vehicles than Illinois. The first five states with the number of machines, figures as of Jan. 1, 1927, are as follows: Texas, 285,977; Illinois, 233,161; Ohio, 231,977; Iowa, 229,000; Pennsylvania, 219,888.
