More than 200 complaints have been registered before the board of review, or 3 times more than last year when the kicks numbered 55, it was learned today. This will mean that the board will be in session for several months at the least.

Benjamin B. Bryan's speed boat, the Bub-a-Dub-Dub in which he had intended to commute for the remainder of the summer between Lake Forest and Chicago, was lost last week from its dock near the Lake Forest bathing beach. It is believed to have been blown away by the high wind and to have sunk in the lake.

The annual picnic of the employees of the Foulds' Milling company was held last Wednesday afternoon at Gages Lake with practically the entire plant and office force and their families in attendance.

Sale of the Herman Schreck farm, located two miles northeast of Libertyville to two Chicago men who will own the tract into two country farms was announced by the former owners last week. The land was sold at the rate of about \$1,000 an acre, the tract bringing a total price of about \$70,000.

Mrs. Sarah A. Pamroy of Twenty-third and Victoria avenue, North Chicago, passed away at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Oscar Mitchell, last week after an extended illness due to old age.

SUITS TO COLLECT BACK TAXES PLANNED

Suits against 18 estates are to be filed for the county by Attorney Charles E. Jack in which claims will be made for taxes on funds alleged to have been hidden during the lifetime of defendants.

The actions are to be taken before the board of review and the hearings will be before that body. Any appeals would have to go directly into the supreme court.

Attorney Jack was retained by the board of supervisors for the purpose of collecting the money alleged due the county.

By delving into inheritance tax reports and tracing the amount of taxes paid by estate during the lifetime of the deceased the attorney has been able to ascertain what should have been paid.

Death, he claims, has brought out the hidden values on which taxes were not paid.

None of the suits will be directed against Waukegan residents. All name estates in Highland Park, Lake Forest and Deerfield with the bulk being from Lake Forest.
