**INSURANCE PAID IN 1927 IN N. S. CITIES**

During the year of 1927 insurance to the extent of \$258,000 was paid to survivors of deceased persons in Waukegan, according to figures made public today by the National Underwriters.

But while this sum of more than a quarter of a million dollars was being distributed among sorrowing heirs of the deceased in Waukegan, the greater sum of \$864,000 was being doled out to relatives and friends of the dead in Lake Forest, \$304,000 was being distributed in Highland Park and the lesser sum of \$33,000 in Libertyville.

**WAUKEGAN LEGION SUMMER FESTIVAL**

**Extensive Program Being Planned for Annual Affair Aug. 31-Sept. 11**

For twelve days, August 31st to September 11th, inclusive, Waukegan will be a mecca of Legionnaires. August 31st, the Homer Dahlinger Post No. 281 of the American Legion opens the festivities with their Annual Summer Festival to be held at the beach. This event will run through Saturday, Sunday and Monday, Labor Day.

As is customary, the Festival will open this year with a gigantic community parade in which civic, fraternal, and social organizations together with industrial and business organizations will participate with floats.

It is estimated that the cost of the parade last year was \$30,000, by conservative figuring. The many expenditures of this event this year will run close to \$50,000.

The Festival proper will be held at the beach in Waukegan. Here there will be boat events, water parade, regattas, and old fiddler's contest which will perhaps be the major event.

Any man, either amateur or professional, over fifty-five years of age, may compete in this contest for the title of the Chaption Old Fiddler of Northern Illinois. Besides many prizes for this event, there will be vaudeville and radio contracts awaiting the winner. The last event every evening will be an old fashioned amateur night, the winner of which will have a contract offered him for the big time professional stage.

There will be a watermelon eating contest, blueberry pie eating contest and the already famous doll buggy parade.

The American Legion Festival Committees have established themselves in their headquarters at 127 E. Washington street, Waukegan, Illinois, and are cordially inviting participants for any of their events. Information will be gladly furnished to those who request it.
