"And that colling smoke from out these rustic wigwams arose towards heaven and spread out over a wilderness untrod by any white men save now and then a DeSoto, or a Ponce DeLeon, in search of a fabulous Eldorado, or the Fountain of Eternal Youth.

"That two hundred years ago, there were fewer white men within this territory than now dwell in the city of Cincinnati.

"That one hundred years ago there were less than now dwell in the cities of New York, Chicago and San Francisco.

"I have faith in our country and in our people. The radicals of today are the conservatives of tomorrow. As we grow older we become wiser, more mellow, more sympathetic of the others' mental attitude. We look back into history and we are glad that we have advanced as far as we have—not toward the millennium, for that never comes, but in the direction of better education, more universal adaption of the golden rule, less thought of self and more of the needs of humanity. The world war inspired many examples of patriotic devotion. The after years, I feel sure are developing just as fine a sentiment of brotherly sympathy and love and in this spirit is the hope of the world to-day."

Their by-laws are such that not one five cent piece can be spent of any money received on any Highwood Day for anything else but for the civic benefit of the City of Highwood, their chief purpose being to boost their school, playgrounds and parks, of which the latter is a very much needed cause. Our books are open for inspection to the citizens of Highwood at any time.

Whatever money we have received in the last two Highwood days is on deposit in the Highwood State Bank to be kept as a starting fund for any needed civic project, such as a public park or other useful improvements, besides we have spent considerable money for the following civic projects:
