Companions Unable to Call for Help But Quickly Recover His Body

James Geary, a Chicago deaf and dumb youth, perished in Round Lake Sunday afternoon while his two mute companions, powerless to shout for aid, were risking their lives in one of the most thrilling tragedies recorded in the coroner's records of Lake county.

Geary's two companions recovered his body less than five minutes after he had gone down, but in spite of the quick recovery efforts to restore life by means of artificial respiration were in vain.
