JULY TEMPERATURE ABOUT AVERAGE HERE

Report of Weather Observer Shows Little Difference From Last Year

Belief held generally in this section that the month of July, just closed, had established records for high temperatures, was disproved by the report on weather conditions for the month made public by John O. Laux, Wankegan government weather ob-

The report shows that the mean temperature for the month was 71.3 degrees as against 70.2 degrees for the same month in 1927. The maximum temperatures for the same month was 91 for this year and 97 for July in 1927. Minimum temperature was 47 for July just passed and 48 for the same month last year.

There was less rainfall during the past month than in July of last year. A total of 3.34 inches fell in July last and 3.96 inches in July of 1927. There were 15 clear days and 16 cloudy or part cloudy days last month and 8 clear days and 23 cloudy or part cloudy days in the same month

It is believed that the uncomfortable period of warm weather was due to the low humidity prevalent last
