Boy Scout News

One of the great needs of leaders of boy scout troops, both scoutmasters and committeemen is the opportunity to exchange experiences and to grow into more powerful troop engineers. The Northshore Area Council, under the leadership of W. R. Bimson, chairman of the committee on Leadership, Personnel and Development, is planning a five year progressive training course to begin next fall.

A scout leader will have the opportunity of doing advanced work each year at the same time applying the principles gained to his local troop. At the end of the five year period, he will be eligible to receive the scoutmasters' key, an emblem of achievement among scoutmasters comparable to the eagle scout badge among scouts.

An elementary course will probably be carried on during the fall months, followed by a standard course for advanced training in the fall and spring. Specialization courses to give more detailed information in such fields as first-aid, life-saving, etc.

Early next fall a course covering the elements of scoutmastership will be given, at the completion of which a certificate will be issued. It will cover the objectives of scouting and those elements and methods of program by which the scouting idea takes hold in boy life.

Principles of Scoutmastership. An advanced course for men who have had many years of experience or who have completed the preceding course, will treat the principles of scoutmastership, stressing the principles of troop program building and the methods of troop administration. More definite information is obtainable at Boy Scout Headquarters, 260 Central Avenue, Highland Park.

Camp Northshore. Camp Northshore, located in the Forest Preserve just west of Glencoe, is a short term camp where scoutmasters may take their troops, where patrol leaders may take their patrols and where individual scouts may go for periods of one day or of several

weeks. Tents and cots are provided, the boys are getting some fine experience in cooking and in camp management, a period each morning is set aside for the improvements of the appearance of the camp. Many visitors have remarked that the boys are "good housekeepers."

Summer Program Important. Scout commissioners of the Northshore Area are co-operating with the scoutmasters in the development of a stronger, summer-time program in Scouting. Considerable stress is given to getting scouts into summer camps for short periods. These are many other activities in the scouting leisure time program which are developmental to boy life. Scouts are urged to take advantage of learn-to-swim campaigns and other community board projects carried on by recreational boards and others in the various towns.

Health and Safety. Health and safety is one of the objectives of the Boy Scout program. But scouts are not only concerned about their own health and safety but a nation-wide move is on to help insure the safety of young children. In a bulletin issued from local scout headquarters last week, Scout Executive Walter McPeck asks every scout to help to build a better understanding and appreciation of the importance of safety of children at crossings. Special warning is given to people who are walking along highways.

Our Boy Scouts. Many scout leaders have suggested the carrying of the Inter-Troop efficiency plan one step further—to include the recognition of all troops who measure up to a certain high standard. The Northshore Council has accordingly announced a monthly troop rating plan with the following purposes in view: 1. Standards of achievement. 2. To stimulate practice fundamentals of the scout program. 3. To promote the greater production of "net results." The plan will help the troop, its leaders, and its parent institution to know where it is strong and where it is weak. Only five factors enter into the rat-

ing plan, expressed in terms of percentage, making a total of 100 per cent. The factors are as follows: 1. Attendance, 24 points; 2. Advancements, 30 points; 3. Outdoor activity, two points; 4. Growth, 20 points; 5. Troop committee meetings, six points. A troop is "lapsed" the first day of the month following the expiration of its charter. All privileges of membership expire with the troop charter. This includes rights to wear the uniform and insignia, appearance at the court of honor, participation in all official scout affairs. Therefore only chartered troops will be rated. No rating will be given to troops whose charters have lapsed. Rating will be on a monthly basis, the first of each calendar month marking the beginning of a new period.

To be known as an honor troop, a troop must rate 90 per cent or better. The leather shield will be awarded as usual to the high point troop and to each troop obtaining the standard of 90 per cent or better, a ribbon streamer will be presented. These awards will be presented by each deputy scout commissioner to the troops that he serves. The latest earned streamer may be carried from the pike of the troop flag standard. A special award will also be presented at the close of the calendar year, to those troops who win nine or more honor ribbons.

JULY TEMPERATURE ABOUT AVERAGE HERE

Report of Weather Observer Shows Little Difference From Last Year. Belief held generally in this section that the month of July, just closed, had established records for high temperatures, was disproved by the report on weather conditions for the month made public by John O. Laux, Waukegan government weather observer.

The report shows that the mean temperature for the month was 71.3 degrees as against 70.2 degrees for the same month in 1927. The maximum temperatures for the same month was 91 for this year and 97 for July in 1927. Minimum temperature was 47 for July just passed and 48 for the same month last year.

There was less rainfall during the past month than in July of last year. A total of 3.34 inches fell in July last and 3.96 inches in July of 1927. There were 15 clear days and 16 cloudy or part cloudy days last month and 8 clear days and 23 cloudy or part cloudy days in the same month of 1927.

It is believed that the uncomfortable period of warm weather was due to the low humidity prevalent last month.
