FEEDING THROUGH SKIN IS BELIEVED POSSIBLE

RECOMMENDS MORE PAY FOR CARRYING MAILS

A recommendation for increased pay to railroads for their mail carrying services has been made to the Interstate Commerce Commission.

After considering complaints joined in by practically all of the railroads in the United States, Frank E. Mullen, examiner for the commission recommended that the railroads be granted an increase of 15 per cent retroactive to July, 1925, in payments for transporting mail.
