From Artic Regions A number of the northern species of duck in the exhibit were obtained by the Rawson-MacMillan Subarctic Expedition of Field Museum, and the John Borden-Field Museum Alaska-Arctic Expedition. Most of the species are represented by both a male and female specimen. The birds were mounted and arranged by Ashley Hine of the museum's staff of taxidermists, who also collected many of them.


