AT CAMP HOLLIDAY**

ARE HELD ON THURSDAY

Prizes and Medals Awarded and
Thousands Cheer Boys as
They March; Demobil-
ized Saturday

Thursday in Camp Holliday, the citizens' military training camp at Fort Sheridan, was visitors' day, presentation day, and general review day all in one. Nearly 9,000 visitors, many of them parents of the citizen soldiers, attended the closing exercises of the camp, which disbanded Saturday.

The rain soaked parade grounds caused a delay until afternoon of the general review of the 2,000 Illinois, Michigan, and Wisconsin boys enrolled.

Prizes and Medals
Presentation of prizes and scholarships to the students having the best records was held in the morning in the post gymnasium, the awards being made by Lieut. Clyde E. Steele, representing Maj. Gen. Paul B. Malone, who was ill, and Col. F. B. Shaw, commandant at Fort Sheridan.

The medal offered by the Veterans of Foreign Wars for proficiency in the basic course was won by Fred L. Winslow of 6740 East End avenue, Chicago. Thomas Smart, son of Lieut. Col. C. T. Smart of Fort Sheridan, won the rifle marksmanship contest and will represent the camp at the national contest to be held at Camp Perry, O. Milo K. Fields of Plainfield, Ill., and Karl Stessel of Milwaukee tied for first place in the machine gun marksmanship contest. The prize for the student maintaining the best record without previous experience was won by George Berlin of Lemont, Ill.

Cheered by Crowd
The precision and bearing of the troops, as they passed by with full pack and equipment, drew favorable comment from Gen. Malone and his officers, and round after round of applause from the spectators who lined the parade grounds.

Following the parade the troops gave exhibitions of close-order drill, wall-scaling, tent-pitching, cavalry drill and battalion formations.

On the target ranges rifle, machine gun and anti-aircraft fire were shown.

Demobilized Saturday
A number of the citizen soldiers left on Friday following the farewell chicken dinner given them. When reveille was sounded at 6 o'clock Saturday morning, however, 1,975 youth, almost the entire original enrollment of the camp, responded. Four hours later, having exchanged their uniforms for civilian clothes, they were en route to their homes.
