- NOTICE OF AWARDED CONTRACT  
 NOTICE is hereby given to all persons interested that bids for the furnishing of all labor, tools and materials necessary for the construction of a connected system of cast iron water mains in McCraen Road, Edgewood Avenue, Glenwood Avenue, Eastwood Avenue, Cloverdale Avenue, Little John Court, Friar Tuck Avenue, Lanoclet Avenue, Robin Hood Place, Arbor Avenue, West Park Avenue, Sunnyside Avenue, Grandview Avenue, Midway Avenue, a forty (40) foot street between Lot 41, J. S. Hovland's Highland Park Acre Subdivision and the east line of the S.W. 1/4 of Section 21, Township 43 north, Range 12 east of the 3rd principal meridian, and Ridge Road, all in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, were opened on the 12th day of August, A. D. 1928, and the E. A. Meyer Construction Co., being the lowest responsible bidder, the contract was awarded to the said E. A. Meyer Construction Co., on the 20th day of August, A. D. 1928.  
 Said bid for the work is as follows:  
 Item No. 1.

3200 lineal feet of ten (10) inch internal diameter asphaltic coated bell and spigot cast iron water pipe weighing sixty-three and eight-tenths (63.8) pounds per lineal foot; the top of the pipe shall be laid five feet six inches (5'6") below the surface of the ground where located, laid with joints of lead and jute; including all clearing, grubbing out trees four (4) inches in diameter and less, all trenching, shoring, bracing, pumping, calking, testing, backfilling with earth, except under existing pavement, where the trenches shall be backfilled with sand or limestone screenings, hereinafter provided, flushing the backfill, restoration of existing pavement where damaged, and removal of all surplus excavated materials, laid complete at Two Dollars Twenty Cents (\$2.20) per lineal foot. \$7,200.00

Item No. 2.  
 3350 lineal feet of eight (8) inch internal diameter, asphaltic coated, bell and spigot cast iron water pipe, weighing forty-seven and five-tenths (47.5) pounds per lineal foot; the top of the pipe shall be laid five feet six inches (5'6") below the surface of the ground where located, laid with joints of lead and jute, including all clearing, grubbing out trees four (4) inches in diameter, or less, all trenching, shoring, bracing, pumping, calking, testing, backfilling with earth, except under Railroad tracks, where the trenches shall be backfilled with sand or limestone screenings, hereinafter provided flushing the backfill, and removal of all excavated materials, laid complete at One Dollar Ninety Cents (\$1.91) per lineal foot. \$10,218.50

Item No. 3.  
 22300 lineal feet of six (6) inch internal diameter, asphaltic coated, bell and spigot cast iron water pipe, weighing thirty-three and three-tenths (33.3) pounds per lineal foot; the top of the pipe shall be laid five feet six inches (5'6") below the surface of the ground where located, laid with joints of lead and jute, including all clearing, grubbing out trees four (4) inches in diameter or less, all trenching, shoring, bracing, pumping, calking, testing, backfilling with earth, flushing the backfill, and removal of all surplus excavated materials, laid complete at One Dollar Twenty Four Cents (\$1.24) per lineal foot. \$27,652.00

Item No. 4.  
 29600 pounds of asphaltic coated, bell and spigot cast iron pipe fittings, with joints of lead and jute, including necessary excavation and testing, Six and One Half Cents (.061/2) per pound. \$1,924.00

Item No. 5.  
 8 ten (10) inch cast iron body, bronze mounted, bronze stemmed double gate water valves, for one hundred fifty (150) pounds working pressure, with joints calked with lead and jute, including testing and set to line and grade, complete in place at Seventy Dollars No Cents (\$70.00) each. \$420.00

Item No. 6.  
 10 eight (8) inch cast iron body, bronze mounted, bronze stemmed, double gate water valves, for one hundred

fifty (150) pounds working pressure, with joints calked with lead and jute, including testing, and set to line and grade, complete in place at Fifty Dollars No Cents (\$50.00) each. \$500.00

Item No. 7.  
 50 six (6) inch cast iron body, bronze mounted, bronze stemmed double gate water valves, for one hundred fifty (150) pounds working pressure, with joints calked with lead and jute, including testing and set to line and grade, complete in place at Thirty Dollars No Cents (\$30.00) each. \$1,500.00

Item No. 8.  
 66 valve vaults constructed of either monolithic concrete or concrete blocks. The concrete to be composed by volume of one (1) part Portland cement, two (2) parts sand, and four (4) parts gravel or crushed stone, mixed with sufficient water. If constructed of monolithic concrete, forms shall be placed on both sides of the walls. If constructed of concrete blocks, said blocks shall be laid with full joints of mortar, composed by volume of one (1) part Portland cement, two (2) parts sand, mixed with sufficient water, and neatly pointed on the inside and outside with a trowel. The inside diameter shall decrease uniformly to the top of the bottom to a plate three (3) feet below the top of the concrete, from which plane the diameter shall decrease uniformly to two (2) feet at the top of the concrete. The walls and bottoms shall be six (6) inches thick and the bottom shall extend to the outside face of the walls. Each vault shall be furnished with an asphaltic coated cast iron manhole cover consisting of a frame weighing three hundred ninety (390) pounds, and a solid lid weighing one hundred fifty (150) pounds, set on top of the concrete, and set to grade where located. The top of the bottom of said vaults shall be six (6) inches below the surface of the water pipe, including all excavating, backfilling with earth, flushing the backfill, and removal of all surplus excavated materials, set at Seventy-five Dollars No Cents (\$75.00) each. \$4,950.00

 73 cast iron body, bronze stemmed fire hydrants, for a depth of trench of six (6) feet, for six (6) inch connection to water main, with five (5) inch valve opening, with six (6) inch cast iron body, bronze mounted auxiliary gate valve, with cast iron box and cover, with two (2) two and one-half (2 1/2) inch Highland Park pattern hose connections, with one Highland Park pattern steam hose connection, including all excavation, calking joints with lead and jute, testing, backfilling with earth, flushing the backfill and one-quarter (1/4) of a cubic yard of gravel around each hydrant drip, and removal of all surplus excavated materials, complete at ten Dollars No Cents Forty Dollars No Cents (\$40.00) each. \$2,920.00
