## RESUME OF OPERA SEASON AT RAVINIA

**EXCEEDS PREVIOUS YEARS** 

Most Brilliant on Record Is General Opinion; List of Operas; Other Features Noted

Seventy-two nights of opera and twenty-two orchestral concerts-such is the record that must be set down to the credit of Ravinia when the seventeenth season of this artistic institution came to a close last Monday night, September 3. Of the concerts, one has been given on Monday night, eleven on Sunday afternoons, and ten these for the children—on Thursday afternons.

During the ten weeks and three days of the season, which began on June 23, thirty-three operas have been brought to production-an achievement with which to conjure when one takes into consideration what it means to arrange such a repertoire as that which has been presented at Ravinia this year. This fact sets a new record for Ravinia, for never before in the history of this opera house have so many works been produced. It equally matter of moment that two of these operas, "Marouf" and "L'Heure Espagnol" were entirely new to the Ravinia repertoire, while "Le Chemineau", "Don Pasquale", and the famous garden scene from "The Jewels of the Madonna" were revived after several seasons absonce.

#### SEVERAL INJURED IN LABOR DAY ACCIDENTS

Two Serious Automobile Smashes Sends Three People to the H. P. Hospital

Labor Day brought a number of automobile accidents to Highland Park as well as other districts in the Chicago area. In one of the most serious, Harold Fossum, an employee of the Bob-'O-Link Golf club, was taken to the Highland Park hospital badly bruised and scratched after the Ford in which he was riding with John Quinn collided with a Buick driven by August Elo of Chicago as the latter was about to turn into Green Bay road from Washington place Friday. The Ford was badly wrecked and the Buick damaged.

Sunday at noon a triple collision occurred at Washington place and Measant avenue. A Ford coupe, driven by Frank Canalia of Kincaid street, Highland Park, was struck and overturned by a Dodge in which C. Lazzratto and John Nichols, both of Glencoe, were riding. The Dodge, careening across the road, was in turn struck by a Nash and overturned, pinning its occupants beneath. It was necessary to lift the Dodge off of Lazzratto and Nichols, who were "taken to the Highland Park hospital badly cut and bruised. Lazzratto suffered a broken shoulder blade. The driver of the Ford was but slightly scratched.
