FEDERAL ROAD AID OVER 73 MILLIONS

For United States and Hawaii, According to Plan for 1929-1931

A total of \$73,125,000 will be available to the United States and Hawaii from the Federal government for road building during each of the years 1929, 1930 and 1931, according to a bulletin issued by the Chicago Motor Club, based on a report of the American Road Builders' association. This means a total of \$219,375,000 contributed by the government for highways, and the states must spend a minimum of \$198,049,992 on Federal-aid roads during the three years in order to take advantage of their federal appropriation.
The report of the American Road Builders' association shows that the

annual contribution of the Federal government constitutes less than 7 per cent of the cost of road construction and maintenance each year in the United States; that it is less than five-hundredths of one cent for each mile traveled by motor vehicles during 1928.

With the exception of thirteen states in which more than 5 per cent of all land is non-taxable, the states must finance at least 50 per cent of

Federal-aid road costs. In no case will the government contribute in excess of \$15,000 a mile.
