KEEP CARS LOCKED WHEN LEFT ON STREET In Residence District Damage of Theft Not So Great, But Children Meddle

The danger of theft, when parking an unlocked car in a residential district, is not so great as the danger to life and property, says a bulletin issued by the accident prevention department of the Chicago Motor club. Children play in the streets in these residential districts, and most children have seen their elders start automobiles and manipulate the levers. Children are mimics and it is not at all unusual for them to climb into parked cars and try to imitate the movements of the adult drivers. An unlocked car is an invitation to them. All that is necessary is to turn the switch, fumble around with the clutch pedal and gear lever, and somehow or other the car will start. It has been done, at the cost of children's lives, and it should be prevented by keeping the car locked.

If the car is a closed one, the body too should be locked, points out the bulletin; for if the car is on an incline, all the child needs to do to cause trouble is to release the emergency brake. It takes but little extra effort to lock the car, and it always should be done.

NEW LACQUER RESULT OF CHEMICAL RESEARCH

The use of a drying film of linseed oil or of a solution of resins was an old art which gave rise to the paint and varnish industry. In recent years the chemist has made the cellulose molecule contribute. He uses nitro cellulose resins, waxes and softeners dissolved in volatile organic solvents such as butyl ester, hydrocarbons and alcohols.

The result is a lacquer combining the advantages of paint and varnish. The growth of the production of this lacquer is even amazing. The year 1924 saw the production of just 1,500,000 g.-lons of such lacquer. Two years later the production jumped to over 20,000,000 gallons. The curve representing the production is still rising very rapidly.

USELESS EXPENDITURE OF ENERGY IN DRIVING Many Motorists Do Not Know How to Relax; Tire Themselves Out

"Much of the fatigue experienced by the average motorist is owing to an unnecessary expenditure of energy in the act of handling his automobile in traffic," says Charles M. Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor club.

"There is plenty of available evidence to substantiate this point. Take the case of curves, especially on a strange highway. It is a driving error to approach a curve at a high rate of speed, and to overcome this the driver is forced to apply his brakes suddenly, and at the same time put forth a great deal of strength to steer the car around the curve safely. There may be many curves in the course of a day's drive, and if the driver continues to approach them at a high rate of speed, he will have used up a great deal of energy by the end of the day.

"Then there is the driver who thinks there is no necessity of shifting to second gear when descending a hill, in spite of warning signs. This means that he will have to hold his car back with the brakes—another useless expenditure of strength.

"Approaching at high speed any point where it is known in advance that a stop must be made is another driving blunder that leaves the driver exhausted at the end of the day, as this practice requires sudden and vigorous application of brakes, and, as a result, muscular fatigue.

"There are many little driving 'tricks' which, if the motorist will learn and practice, will not only conserve the driver's energy, but will also lengthen the life of the car."

SUMATRA NATIVES THINK DEAD RETURN Magicians Encourage Belief and Use Wooden Figures in Rites

Primitive tribesmen of the island of Sumatra believe that the spirit of a dead person returns a few months after his funeral for one last celebration with his relatives and friends. This belief, according to Dr. Berthold Laufer, curator of anthropology at Field Museum of Natural History, is fostered by a form of faked spiritualistic seance devised by native magicians who dominate the lives of their less crafty fellow tribesmen.

When the time arrives for the return of a spirit, the magicians make a wooden figure in the image of the deceased. The head, arms and legs of the figure are hinged, and connected with strings underneath the clothing placed on it. At the place of assemblage for the ceremony the figure is placed before the people in semi-darkness, in such a position that the mechanics of the scheme cannot be seen. The tribesmen begin their ceremonial singing and dancing. A magician solemnly summons the dead to join them, and to indicate that he is amongst them by letting his spirit enter and animate the figure of his body.

The magician then manipulates the strings, and the figure moves its head, and jerks its arms and legs as if it were joining in the dancing. This, the natives believe, is the last communication of the spirit with his relatives. After the ceremony the spirit is thought to separate itself forever from the living.

One of these figures, complete with its strings, is on exhibition at Field Museum. It was used by the magicians of the Toba Batak tribe, and was brought from Sumatra by the Arthur B. Jones expedition to Malaysia.

SECTION 1: That the Annual Appropriation bill making appropriations for corporate purposes for the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1929, and ending April 30th, 1929, was filed the 5th day of July, A.D. 1929, and approved the 9th day of July, A.D. 1929, and thereafter published as provided by law, which said ordinance by reference is hereby made a part hereof.
