

"ROSH HASHANAH" IS OBSERVED THIS WEEK

Special Services at North Shore Congregation Israel, Friday

Jewry the world over will usher in its celebration of the New Year, called in Hebrew "Rosh Hashanah," with religious services on Friday evening, September 14, 1928. In accordance with the prescribed commandment in the Bible, Reform Judaism devotes one day to the observance of this holiday. With the celebration of this solemn festival which carries a signal message to both Jew and mankind at large, this will open the year of 5689 of the Jewish calendar.

Far back in the earliest times, the Hebrew New Year began in autumn with the opening of the agricultural year of the Jewish people in Palestine—a system adopted by all Semitic peoples. From ancient times on, the beginning of the economic year was celebrated in some special way. On this day there was to be a holy convocation of the people, trumpets were to be blown, and special sacrifices were to be offered at the altar of the Jerusalem Temple. Though the Bible refers to this day as "The memorial of blowing of trumpets" and "The day of the blowing of trumpets," yet it was evidently regarded as the New Year of the agricultural cycle by the Jewish people at a very early date.

But with the gradual growth of the Jewish people following their dispersion, New Year's Day assumed a new meaning and a higher value in Jewish life. In Rabbinic literature this holiday is regarded as the commemoration of the beginning of the creation of the world. It is the day upon which all the creatures of the world pass for judgment before the Creator, even as sheep pass before the shepherd. This idea of New Year as the great Day of Judgment gave rise to a beautiful and elaborate ritual throughout the middle ages. It fashioned this holiday into a solemn occasion upon which every Jew is to reawaken within himself his loyalty to the teach-

ings of Judaism. And, finally, it was emphasized that the New Year is a day for self-examination and reflection upon the past deeds—a day upon which man searches the inner recesses of his heart and sincerely resolves to turn from all misdeeds of the past year. This idea is embodied in almost every prayer of the Reform Jewish ritual for the day.

The Shofar, or ram's horn, is still blown in the Synagogue today. Its purpose is to stir the heart of man and awaken him to the spirit of the solemn day; it is to remind him of his responsibilities to his fellow men and of his obligations to God.

Saturday morning, Sept. 15 at 10:00 o'clock. The subject of Rabbi Louis J. Koppald's sermon on Friday evening, Sept. 14, will be "The Challenge" and on Saturday morning, September 15, "The Charge."

\$25,000 IMPROVEMENT FOR POOR FARM

VOTED BY SUPERVISORS

Ends Controversy; Recommend Increase in County Budget; To Aid Various Funds

The Lake county board of supervisors are in full swing at the court house in Waukegan, with practically all members present. All five of Deerfield township members were on the job. They are Supervisors Wm. J. Obee, W. E. Bletsch, A. W. Vercoe, Chas. Harbaugh, and Paul L. Udell. James O'Connor represented West Deerfield.

Settling one of the big problems, which has faced the board for years, an appropriation of \$25,000 was voted to repair and make fireproof the buildings of the county poor farm. It is believed that this will end all controversy on the matter for at least ten years, when it is hoped that the natural increase in land values will make it possible to sell the present site of the poor farm, and erect adequate buildings on another site.

The board also recommended that the county budget be increased from

\$478,000 to \$526,000. It was shown that expenses in many departments had increased, due to rapid growth of the county. Notable among the places requiring larger appropriations were the county hospital, poor claims, blind pensions, and mothers' pensions. The \$25,000 voted to make fireproof the county poor farm is also included in this increase.

GOOD DRIVING MATTER OF INTELLIGENCE, TOO

"Good driving is a matter not of technical excellence in shifting gears, alone, but of intelligence as well. Any one may learn the actual handling of an automobile, but the good driver has something more than just sureness of foot and hand, desirable those qualities may be," says Charles M. Hayes, president of the Chicago Motor club.

"For example, at a boulevard a motorist may come to a stop, as is required by law, and then instantly force his way so aggressively that drivers of dozens of vehicles are compelled to slam on their brakes to avoid an accident. This is not good driving.

"Courteous driving, the kind that gives way to the car climbing a steep hill; to the less experienced driver; that stops to let a bewildered pedestrian reach the other side; is good driving. It is the kind of driving that some few persons will never achieve."
