

PLANTING OF TREES ALONG ROADS, PLAN

ON FEDERAL HIGHWAYS

Amendment to Congressional Act Provides That This Beautification Idea May Be Included Later

Beautification of the highways of the United States now looms as a possibility, which may be realized within a comparatively short span of years, as the result of congressional amendment to the Federal Highway act, providing for the planting and maintenance of shade trees along the federal-aid highway system, it was announced recently by the American Motorists association at Washington.

An amendment to the act provides that specifications for federal aid projects hereafter may include planting and maintenance of shade trees, this step being the first distinct departure from a federal policy of appropriating only for roadbed and directly kindred construction operation. The amendment to the act is regarded by proponents of highway beautification as one of the greatest strides yet taken toward the highways of the United States traffic lanes of distinct attraction.

Will Be Welcomed
"The planting and maintenance of shade trees along the federal aid highway system of the United States will add materially to the joys of motoring and will be welcomed by the millions of motorists who use the highways daily, Vice-President Si Mayer of the motoring organization, and president of the Automobile club of Illinois, declared.

"Though years may be required to bring the highways of this country to that plane of tree-lined beauty achieved on the vast vistas of traffic arteries in Europe, this amendment starts the nation toward accomplishment of true beautification of its highways—something long desired by every American motorist."

Two other amendments to the federal aid highway act, agreed upon by the house and senate at the same time, provided for full financing of primary federal aid projects and secondary feeders to the primary roads in areas of public lands in states where population averages 10 or less persons per square mile and also provided that the system of federal aid highways eligible for expenditure of federal funds in any state may exceed seven per cent of the total highway mileage of such federal roads within national forests, Indian or other federal reservations.

HOW THE NAVY MAKES BAKED BEANS; RECIPE

Given in Reply to Letter to Commandant; Woman Asks For Details

A letter has been received by Rear Admiral Thomas T. Craven, U. S. Navy, commandant of Great Lakes Naval Training Station, written by the wife of a former enlisted man of the navy, that bears eloquent testimony to the excellence of the cuisine in the naval service. It reads as follows:

"I am writing to you in regards to baked beans recipe. My husband used to be in the navy and he surely enjoyed the beans. So I was wondering if you could or would get the recipe for me. I surely would appreciate a reply. If you can't send it to me would you please state where it may be procured. I have tried so many different ways and he still says they aren't like what he got in the navy. So please may I hear from you on this baked beans recipe."

The recipe furnished in compliance with this request is published for the benefit of the wives who may wish to prepare baked beans in the way that evidently finds much favor with Uncle Sam's blue jackets. Here it is:

- 1/2 pounds beans
 - 1 cup catsup
 - 1/2 cup tomatoes
 - 1 teaspoon mustard
 - 1/4 cup dark molasses
 - 1/4 cup diced ham or bacon
- Pick over the beans to free them of stones or dirt, washing them in two or three waters. Cover with cold water and soak for five or six hours (over night if possible), then drain off water. Cover beans with clear cold water and bring to boiling point. Reduce the fire and let simmer until the beans can be mashed between the fingers. Turn the beans into an iron baking pot; add tomatoes, catsup, mustard, salt, pepper, molasses and diced ham or bacon, and mix thoroughly. Place in oven and bake for about eight hours, adding a little water occasionally.

BROADER POWERS FOR WELFARE DEPARTMENT

IN STATE OF ILLINOIS

Recent Ruling by Courts Gives Further Safeguards Against Adoption of Children In Institutions

Under a ruling just handed down by the office of the attorney general broader powers are delegated to the Department of Public Welfare in the placement and adoption of children into family homes.

The maternity hospital act provides "a child born in a maternity hospital shall not be placed in a family home or legally adopted until such home shall have been investigated and approved by the state Department of Public Welfare."

For some time past the department has been operating on the theory that this law applied only to illegitimate children placed by the hospital, or regularly licensed child-placing agencies. The recent opinion of the attorney general's office states that: "in view of the certainty of the language used and the omission of any exceptions this would apply to legitimate as well as illegitimate children and that the approval of the home must be obtained even though the placement be made by or with the consent of either or both parents."

Adds Further Safeguard
"This opinion," says Roy James Battis, state superintendent of Child Welfare, "adds further safeguards against the promiscuous placement of legitimate and illegitimate infants through the medium of advertisements appearing in the daily press.

"In order to forestall investigation of their homes by the state Department of Public Welfare, persons desiring to obtain a child for adoption, and likewise unwed mothers desiring to place their children for adoption without any social service supervision, have been placing advertisements in the daily press. Thus the two have

been brought together and adoption proceedings consummated in many instances without detection. Those reported to the department by neighbors, when investigated, were in most cases found to be most unsatisfactory to the best interests of the child.

"Newspapers and other advertising mediums can render a great service to the future citizenry of Illinois by reporting these advertisements directly to the Department of Public Welfare. This co-operation will help to protect unfortunate children against improper placements, as well as satisfy the intent of the law."
