### On New Basis

However, it was explained that under the new law and ruling of the state superintendent of public instruction the non-high school board would be able to distribute the fund on the basis of the cost of education in the several high schools rather than on the basis of even division among the number of high school pupils in the non-high school district. If there is still a shortage, it was explained, this will stand as a lien against the non-high school fund next year and take precedence.

In the meantime the students are back in school, and the high school authorities have given assurance that the pupils will be given every assistance in making up the time lost during their temporary dismissal.

Tribute by Minister There are certain words which I desire to read in this intimate circle concerning her in whose memory we

It was only in the last few years that I was privileged to know her, years in which it was clear that her physical resources had been sorely taxed and would hardly permit her to live out the full span that might otherwise have been hers. But there were two marks of her personality which stood out so definitely that one never thought of her physical limitations and it is of these that I would speak now.

The first was a darting, eager quickness of mind and heart which brought one instantly within reach of her friendly outpouring of herself. It showed in the smile that lighted up her face, the ready appreciation of all about her. It was as if the vital strength of her soul far outstripped the vital strength of her body, as if some law of compensation had adjusted matters so that bodily weakness only intensified a natural endowment of insight and gladness. She carried a very rich portion of something precious within herself. It was a quality which made for thoroughness in all that she undertook. At this meeting it was shown that the amount of expenditures for 1927 were \$68,285.14, the total value of the home buildings, grounds and equipment is \$374,110.25 and the bank balances and investments amount to \$40,627.01.

The home can accommodate one hundred and twenty and is a highgrade, up-to-date fireproof structure. The grounds are well kept and indeed, the building and grounds are a show-place which compares favorably with any similar movement on the North Shore.
