It was evident that she had an endowment of talent, a high range of balanced qualities which never left her at a loss. She worked and thought always to some conclusion. She had too much good sense to remain content with negative results. She was always pressing onward to the solution that satisfied.

It is hard to describe this quality. One could feel its impression in talking with her, but it eludes analysis. Her mind moved rapidly; but could not be content with anything superficial. Her spirit was tolerant, kind, appreciative. We must be content to say that she belonged to that rather rare group of unusual people who leave a deeper memory upon their friends that can well be put into words. Their gift transcended the categories that one can measure and must always remain felt rather than expressed.

Second Impression
The second impression that was so unmistakable consisted of the mingled elements of confidence and courage and good cheer that always possessed her. During the years of our friendship it was clear that the odds were not on her side. She went from weakness to greater weakness, from one limitation to a deeper limitation. But there was no sign of dismay, no note of misgiving, no word of complaint, no hint of selfishness. She had her loved ones about her and in them she found her abiding satisfaction, never alluding to anything that might have caused her to feel that in some respects she had been deprived of her just due. It meant a great deal to me to have her as a parishioner. In every fellowship of worshippers there are always a few who seem to give forth infinitely more than they can ever receive. Instinctively they share their inner strength and provide encouragement for all who strive. She was of that company. In meeting her on the street or chatting by her bedside there was the impression of receiving something that helped. It was her spiritual gift. It was born of her faith and made beautiful by the suffering to which she never referred.

Some where in his life of Alice Freeman Palmer her husband remarks that it is altogether incredible that so fair a spirit as she was can find its final explanation in a few particles of disordered matter. Her passing in the fullness of her mature vision could only be justified in the thought of some further reach of life. That thought is in our minds now. The one in whose memory we meet had so many uncompleted plans, held so many hopes for those she loved which she wanted to see realized, reached forward with such eager zest to the fullness of life, that it seems her spirit even now must continue on its journey, knowing more of God and His ways than can be vouchsafed to us. That is our faith, and in it we gather strength for the way.

Road Bandits Break Into Place Friday Night and Steal Merchandise

Robbers Friday night broke into a gasoline filling station on Milwaukee avenue about a mile and a half south of Half Day and stole several boxes of cigars, cartons of cigarettes, five inner tubes, and a five cent vending machine containing considerable cash.

The robbery was discovered early Saturday morning by the station manager, Chris Christensen, when he opened up for the day. He notified the office of Sheriff Lawrence Doolittle and Deputy Charles Krueger was sent out to make an investigation.

Krueger found that entrance into the station was gained by prying open a window on the side of the building. The robbery is believed to have taken place after midnight.

**WOMAN'S ARM BROKEN

Two Hurt in Crash on Prairie Avenue; Man Hit By Train

Two accidents are reported by the police during the past week in which persons were injured. On Sept. 16, Mrs. T. J.
