

COUNTY OFFICIALS REPORT TO BOARD

Sheriff, County Clerk and Circuit Clerk Render Their Accounts

Sheriff Lawrence A. Doolittle submitted a report to the board of supervisors for a period of six months, December 4 to June 3, showing the sum of \$2,982.43 balance after paying expenses of his office.

The report of County Clerk Law A. Hendee for the last six months showed receipts of \$17,171.19 and disbursements of \$14,137.64, leaving a balance of \$3,033.55.

Circuit Clerk Lyman J. Wilmut reported that he had a balance of \$3,229.46 for six months. The receipts of his office amounted to \$8,229.66 and the expenditures \$5,000.20.

A communication from Elmer Clavey, West Deerfield township highway commissioner, requesting that the county allow this township \$3,500, half of the expense of building a bridge over the Chicago river in that township.

The road and bridge committee in a report to the board stated that the contract for improvement of the county hospital drives had been let to the low bidder, John Torrissin.

COUNTY BOARD MAKES TRUCKS, BUSES TAXED

Favors Legislation Compelling Them to Pay for Privilege of Using Roads

The Lake county board of supervisors last week went on record in favor of having legislation enacted compelling all truck lines and all busses using hard roads of the county to pay for special privileges.

The resolution states that the county board believes that competition of the National Roadway Lines, Inc., or any other bus or truck line operating over state bond issue or other hard roads built and owned by the people when so operated at rates lower than railroads is unfair to railroads.

The National Roadway Lines, Inc., apparently has petitioned the Illinois Commerce Commission not to make a charge for their trucks using hard roads, as the resolution provides that the board resist the petition of this concern before the Illinois Commerce Commission.

DUCK HUNTING SEASON OPENED LAST SUNDAY

Last Sunday marked the opening of the duck hunting season and the trek of hunters to the famous Lake county lake region is on.

According to information given out by the Deputy United States Game Warden at Peoria, Ill., a closed season has been declared on woodchucks, yellowlegs, and plover.

It is unlawful to hunt waterfowl with a power boat or sail boat. A rowboat equipped with an outboard motor is classed as a power boat, and it is contrary to law to use such boat for shooting waterfowl, either crippled or otherwise, regardless of whether the engine is running or not.

COON SHUTS OFF LIGHT POWER, GRAYSLAKE

Climbs Pole and Shorts Circuit When in Contact With 33,000 Volts

An inquisitive coon which had climbed onto one of the Public Service company poles carrying a high voltage line caused a short circuit, which plunged the Grayslake district, which is supplied through the substation, into darkness for several minutes Tuesday evening.

The animal came in contact with the wires carrying 33,000 volts, the resulting short circuit immediately killing the coon and causing a flash that was visible for several miles. All the lights and power were off throughout the district as far as Waukegan until the motors caught again to supply the current.

One of the heavy insulators was shattered by the short circuit, and power was off from 8:30 until about midnight while repairs were being made.

PATIENT HANGS SELF IN COUNTY HOSPITAL

William Searls, Formerly of Lake Zurich, Is Dead By Suicide

William Searls, 72 years old, formerly a resident of Lake Zurich but who has been confined to the Lake County General hospital since June 22, committed suicide in his room at the hospital last Wednesday night by strangling himself with a nightshirt.

Two night nurses at the hospital found Searls just as the man was breathing his last. They immediately summoned Dr. Karl M. Beck but Searls was already beyond aid.

Searls, according to hospital authorities, was admitted on June 22. He had suffered a paralytic stroke while living at Lake Zurich some time previously and this, coupled with the age of the man, caused him to be brought in for observation.
