You, and each of you, are hereby notified that a special meeting of the members of said Community Service of Highland Park is hereby called for Tuesday evening, October 2, 1928, at 8:00 o'clock p. m., in the premises used by said corporation for its activities, being in the rear of the store of Albert Larson, 389 Central Avenue, Highland Park, Illinois, for the following purposes:

1. Section 5. The directors of the corporation shall have full, complete, and final power to sell, lease, mortgage, pledge, and otherwise dispose of any assets, property, and estate of the corporation, including real estate and interests in real estate, and shall have the power and right to authorize the officers of the corporation to mortgage, contract, and/or other in-execute, acknowledge, and deliver conveyances, deeds, leases, trust deeds, instruments in order to effectuate said purposes. No member of the corporation shall have any right, title, or interest of any kind in and to any of the assets, property, and/or estate of the corporation, but such assets, property, and estate, upon the winding up or dissolution of the corporation, shall be paid over, transferred, and delivered to such municipal or other corporation in Highland Park as may be determined by the then acting board of directors to be most available for carrying out the original purposes of this corporation. In the absence of any such designation of beneficiary by the then acting board of directors, the City of Highland Park shall become the beneficiary of such property. No vote of the members of the corporation shall be necessary in order to authorize the directors of the corporation to sell, assign, transfer, or otherwise dispose of the property of the corporation in accordance with this section.
  3. To transact such other business as may come before said meeting.
