that a special meeting of the members of said Community Service of Highland Park is hereby called for Tuesday evening, October 2. 1928, at 8:00 o'clock p.m., in the premises used by said corporation for its activities, being in the rear of the store of Albert Larmodestly tucking away is being lilinois, for the following purposes: 1. To authorize the sale of the real estate

of said corporation for the sum of Seventyfive Thousand Dollars (\$75,000), of which Thirty-Five Thousand Dollars (\$35,006) shall be paid in cash, Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,-000) by assuming and agreeing to pay a first mortgage lien of said amount, and the balance in a purchase money mortgage of Thirty Thousand Dollars (\$30,000) due in five 151 years from its date, taxes for 1928 to be pro-rated, and the seller to furnish at its expense a guaranty policy issued by the Chicago Title and Trust Company, and to authorize the officers of the corporation to consume such transaction and to agree upon other details in their discretion. 2. Section 5. The directors of the corporation shall have full, complete, and final power to sell, exchange, lease, mortgage, pledge, and otherwise distuse of any assets, property, and estate of the corporation, including real estate and interests in real estate, and shall have the power and right to authorize the officers of the corporation to mortgages, contracts, and/or other inexecute, acknowledge, and deliver conveyances, deeds, leases, trust deeds, struments in order to effectuate said purposes. No member of the corporation shall have any right, title, or interest of any kind in and to any of the assets, property, and or estate of the corporation, but such assets, property. and estate, upon the winding up or dissolution of the corporation, shall be taid over, transferred, and delivered to such municipal or other corporation in Highland Park as may be determined by the then acting board of directors to be most available for carrying out the original purposes of this corporation. In the absence of any such designation of beneficiary by the then acting board of directors, the City of Highland Park short become the beneficiary of such property. No vote of the members of the corporation shall be necessary in order to authorize the directors of the corporation to sell, assign, transfer, or otherwise dispose of the property of the corporation in accordance with this section."
