# REGISTRATION DAYS ARE OCT. 16 AND 30

GET NAMES ON JOLL LIST

Dates Not Same af in Cook Co., It Is Explained; Voting Places in All Precints Open

Registration thys in Lake county this year will be on October 16 and 30, it has been announced from the office of County Clerk Hendee, in Waukegan. On these two days all voters of the county are requested to see that their names are on the poll list; otherwise they will at least be required to swear in their votes on election day, November 6, and may be unable to cast their ballots.

If you have moved from one precinct to another since the last election in the county at which you voted, be sure to see that your name is registered in the precinct in which you are now living. The law requires that a person voting must have resid d a year in the state, 90 days in the county and 30 days in the preclict at the time of the election. linese who have not moved from their uncinet in the county since they last and probably will find their names are listed in the poll books, but it is pest to make sure by visiting the registration places on either October 16 or 30.

It is explained that registration days in Lake county are not the same as those in Cook county. Local readers of Chicago newspapers have been somewhat misled in this respect, i 14 understood.

On the basis of the 1924 election there are 11,796 straight Republican votes in the county, although President Coolidge received 18,306. The Democratic and LaFollette brought the total up to 23,676.

Foliticians anticipate that more than 25,000 ballots will be counted this fall.

All precincts will be open, according to County Clerk Lew A. Hendee, on the two general registration days. Those absent from the city must file the usual absentee application

for registration. hegistration may be made at the regular polling places in the several precincis in each township. The ter ritory covered by the voting precincts in Deerfield township and the polling place in each are herewith described.
