
Deerfield

WIRE PREVENTION PROCLAMATION OUT

IS\ISSUED BY GOVERNOR

Observance of Week of 7 to 13 to Emphasize Med of Reduction of Fire Hazards

Every cay and town in the state of Illinois all join in the fight against fires and the best methods are outlined in Go. Small's proclamation which follows Phocia mation

To the people of Illinois greeting: Illinois contributed \$21,961,452 to the national tire waste last year. This means the destruction of property by fire at the rate of more than \$2,500

Property destroyed by fire is a net economic loss. Insurance does not bring back the property. It simply reimburses the owners. It comes out of the pockets of the public, who pay the premiums. Hence the public should be vitally interested in reduc-

In addition, 104 persons lost their lives in Illinois last year through fire or burns and 159 were injured or

Ordinary carefulness and attention to simple fire hazards would prevent 90 per cent of all fires.

Now, therefore, I. Len Small, governor of Illinois, do hereby appoint and proclaim the week from Oc. 7 to Oct. 13, 1928, to be observed in the state of Illinois as Fire Prevenion week.

This is an appropriate time to see that heating plants and flues are cleaned out, inspected and put in safe condition for winter use; that premises are thoroughly cleaned up and rubbish burned; that electrical wiring and gas connections are checked for hazards; that gasoline, oils, paints, arnishes and similar inflammables are safely stored.

Business men and manufacturers -hould see that their places are kept fice from unnecessary fire hazards, that inflammable materials are safely stored and that hazardous processes are strictly safeguarded.

Those in chearge of schools, theaters, hopitals, churches, hotels, pubhe halls and other public places are required by law to maintain satisfactory fire escapes and exit facilities and keep their buildings safe from tire. Fire drills should be conducted, especially in the schools.

City and village officials can control fire hazards effectively by proper ordinances and inspection of property. They should do this wholeheartedly.

A practical observance of Fire Prevention week should be held in every community so as to impress on the public the necessity of preventing res. Mayors, fire chiefs, chambers of commerce and civic organizations should co-operate to this end. Instructive talks should be given in the schools and civic organizations should devote their meetings during this week to fire prevention. Co-operation of press and pulpit is invited.
