Proclamation

0 V

Whereas the 11th of November 1918 marked the cessation of the most destructive and far reaching war in human annals: and

Whereas, it is fitting that the recurring anniversary of this day should be commemorated with thanksgiving and prayers, and by exercises designed to further the cause of permanent peace through the maintenance of good will and friendly relations between nations; and

Whereas, by concurrent resolution of the Senate and the House of Representatives and by proclamation of the President of the United States, and by proclamation of the Governor of the State of Illinois for the observance of Armistice Day,

Now Therefore, I, B. F. Lewis, Mayor of the city of Highland Park, do hereby order that the flag of the United States be displayed on November 11th and do invite all the people of Highland Park to observe the day in schools and churches and other suitable places with appropriate ceremonies, giving expression to our gratitude that peace exists and to our sincere desire that such amicable relations with all other peoples may continue.
