

GRAND JURY BRINGS IN 1927 TRUE BILL

SIX MURDER INDICTMENTS

Five in Beck Case and One in Lake Villa Killing; Docket Is Light One It Is Reported

After a two-day session the October grand jury last Thursday returned 27 true bills naming 33 defendants in indictments.

Six were indicted for murder, but outside of that the crimes alleged were minor affairs for the most part. LIGHT SESSION—lc bd

As the last grand jury was discharged in March it had been believed that there would be two score cases or more and the fact that only 27 true bills were voted stamps the session as one of the lightest ever held for the same period of the year.

Albert Coffill, 63, of Long Lake, was indicted on a charge of murdering Erwin Snyder, 30, of Lake Villa, July 25. No bail was set. Coffill is held in the county jail.

Claud Clark, Dominick Bresette, Harold Martin, John Brown and Arthur Boone were indicted on charges of murder and robbery and larceny in connection with the slaying of Will Beck, Millburn farmer, May 16. All of these men are held in the county jail without bail.

WIDENING MILWAUKEE AVE. IN LIBERTYVILLE

Start Work on Section of That Highway in That City Last Week

Work of broadening a section of Milwaukee avenue in the heart of the business district was started in Libertyville last week. This principal highway is to be widened between Church street and Broadway. Seventeen additional feet of paving will be laid on the east side of the street, bridging the total width to 40 feet. There also will be a ten foot cement sidewalk.

The widening of the street is being furthered by the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois which has just completed the erection of a new \$250,000 store and office building on that portion of Milwaukee avenue where the pavement is to be widened. Property owners will pay the entire expense of the improvement.

All poles are to be removed from that portion of the street and new ornamental lights will be installed. This system is to be extended in Church street from Milwaukee avenue to Wright court.

Libertyville has just completed the installation of \$100,000 worth of paving.

DUDLEY CRAFTS WATSON LECTURES AT WINNETKA

Dudley Crafts Watson, chief lecturer on the staff of the Chicago Art Institute, next Monday evening, Oct. 23, will give the second of a series of talks under the auspices of the North Shore Art League at Matz hall, Winnetka Community house. Mr. Watson's topic will be "Greece and Its Sculpture."

Proceeds from this series of six lectures will be added to a fund established for the creation of a community studio for the league. In addition, some of the proceeds will be used in the Chicago area, as well as many enterprising and prominent lectures, the North Shore Art League has long felt the want of a central headquarters and art center where studio facilities would be available. While no definite location has been announced, tentative plans call for a site on an extensive layout, with provision made for all of the arts.

Topics announced by Mr. Watson for this series are: Monday, Nov. 5, "Art and Life of North Africa;" Monday, Nov. 19, "Modern Architecture;" Monday, Dec. 3, "Life and Art of the Slavic Republics;" Monday, Dec. 17, "Life and Art of Spain."

SEPTEMBER UNUSUALLY COOL RECORDS SHOW

The month of September this year was unusually cool and during the 30 days not one extremely hot day was experienced, according to the government weather report of John O. Laux, Waukegan weather observer. The hottest weather during the month occurred on September 10 when a temperature of 88 degrees was recorded. Last year on Sept. 21 the temperature was 98 degrees.

The total rainfall this September was less than half the number of inches which fell in September, 1927 and for this reason 19 clear days were recorded as compared to only 13 in September 1927.

Things to Cook

Ham Hawaiian
1 thick slice ham, weight 1 lb.
2 large sweet potatoes
4 large slices pineapples
1/2 teaspoon sugar
1 egg
1/2 cup flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon milk.

Trim the fat from ham, place ham in a hot skillet and brown on both sides. Remove to a small roasting pan, cover with boiling water and place in oven registering 400 degrees. In the meantime, cook in boiling water until partially tender the sweet potatoes, remove skins, and cut potatoes lengthwise in thick slices. When the ham has cooked for half an hour, place the potatoes in the pan with it and continue cooking for another half hour. Make a batter by sifting together the flour, salt and sugar. Add egg, well beaten, and sufficient milk to make a batter. Dip the pineapple into the batter. Try out the fat which was trimmed from the ham and saute the pineapple in it. Serve the ham surrounded by potatoes and pineapple, garnish with parsley, and sprinkle a little paprika over the potatoes. Serves six.

Cabbage au Gratin
Wash, chop and soak a small head of cabbage in cold water for 15 minutes; put into boiling salted water; put into boiling water and boil slowly for 5 minutes, drain. While this is boiling make a Cream Sauce from 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1 teaspoon salt, a dash of pepper, and 1 cup milk; add 4 tablespoons chopped or grated cheese;

take from the fire and add the yolks of 2 hard cooked eggs pressed through a sieve. Chop the whites very fine and add them also. Put a layer of this in the baking dish, then a layer of cabbage having the last layer sauce. Cover with bread crumbs and bake in a quick oven for 20 minutes.

Candlestick Salad, Individual
1 slice canned pineapple
1/2 banana, cut cross-wise
Shredded Coconut
Strip green pepper
Maraschino cherry
Fruit Salad Dressing
Lettuce

For the base of the candlestick, place the slice of pineapple on a leaf of lettuce and surround with fruit salad dressing piped through a pastry tube. For the candlestick, point the cut end of the banana half and place it in an upright position in the cavity of the pineapple slice. In the side of the banana stick the strip of green pepper to simulate the handle. On the top of the banana place the maraschino cherry or a strawberry, keeping it in position with a toothpick. Stick a piece of shredded coconut in the cherry for a wick. Serve additional salad dressing in tiny bonbon dishes at each place. Serves one.

Peach Tapioca
Cover six tablespoons "minute tapioca" with cold water; let soak a few minutes, then add 1 1/4 cups boiling water, 1/2 teaspoon salt and cook in double boiler until transparent. If canned peaches are used, use the syrup of the peaches as far as possible, and if more liquid is needed to make up 1 1/4 cups use hot water; also add 1/4 cup sugar to the liquid in which the tapioca is cooked. In a baking pan arrange the halves of peaches over which powdered sugar has been sprinkled. When the tapioca is done pour over the peaches and set in a cold place. Serve very cold with whipped cream.
