WIDENING MILWAUKEE

Highway in That City Last Week

Work of broadening a section of Milwaukee avenue in the heart of the business district was started in Libertyville last week. This principal highway is to be widened between Church street and Broadway. Seventeen additional feet of paving will be laid on the east side of the street, bridging the total width to 40 feet. There also will be a ten foot cement sidewalk.

The widening of the street is being furthered by the Public Service Company of Northern Illinois which! has just completed the erection of a new \$250,000 store and office building on that portion of Milwauker avenue where the pavement is to be widened.
