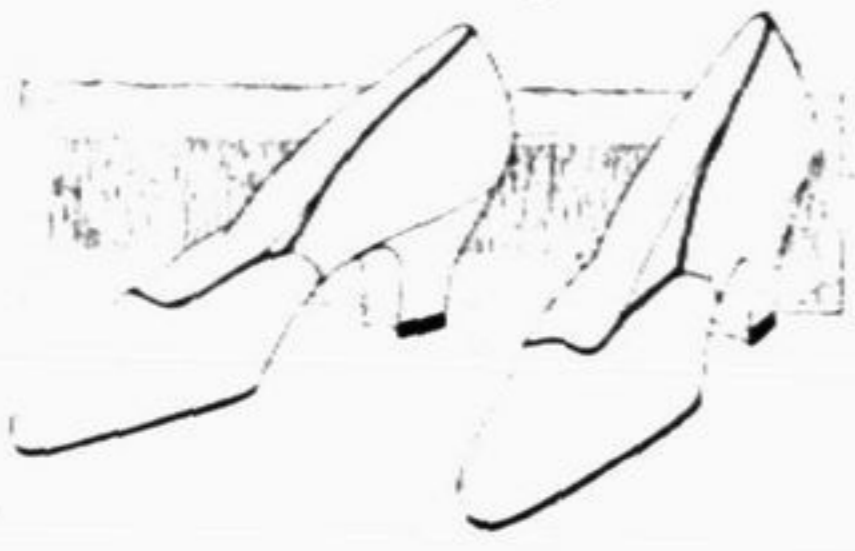

WAUKEGAN SATURDAY**

GAME AT COUNTY SEAT

Other Battles on Stiff Card
For Season; Lose to Davenport at That City
Last Saturday

They could gain nothing through the line or around the ends and were forced to kick. Deerfield made a first down, but then could go nowhere and Rogan punted.

ADMITTED TO THE BAR**

Mortimer Singer Presented to Illinois Supreme Court at Springfield Today

Mortimer Singer, Publisher of the Highland Park News, at one time the youngest reporter ever assigned to a foreign post, was admitted to the Illinois Bar before the Illinois Supreme Court at Springfield this morning.

During the year he spent in Germany as foreign correspondent, Mr. Singer interviewed some of the most inaccessible diplomats. Among the exclusive stories which resulted were those concerning President Ebert, Germany's first president, Hugo Stinnes the great German financier, and Chancellor Wirth (whose interest in the young reporter was so great that he took the trouble to look him up when he visited this country, three years ago.)

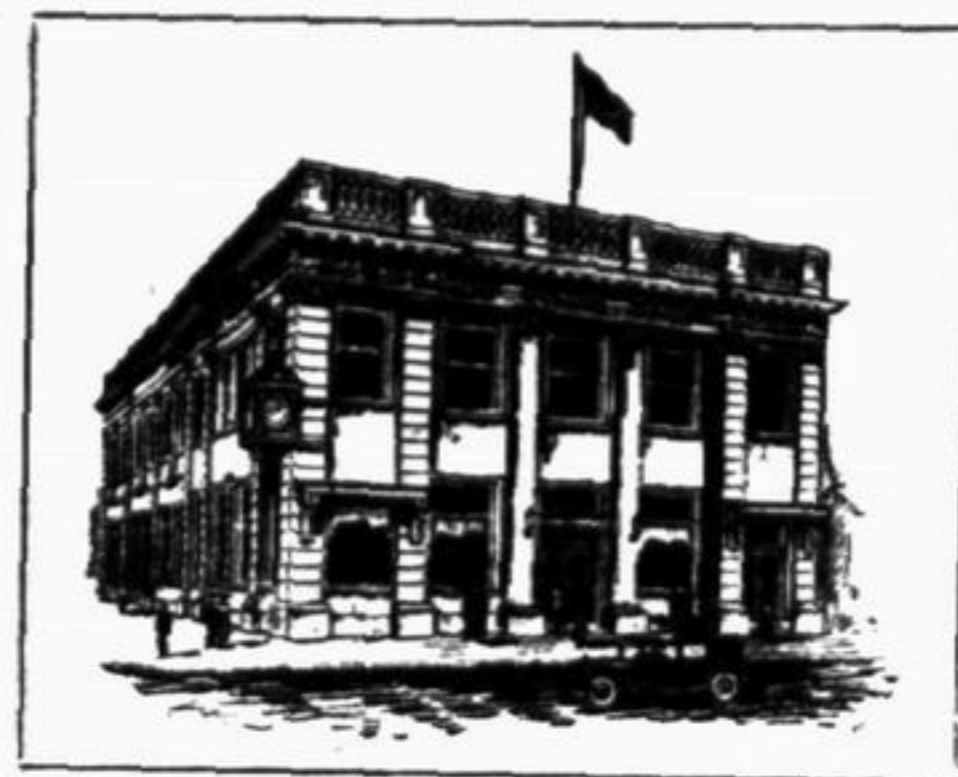

**ATTEMPT TO BURN HOME
OF HIGHWOOD EX-CHIEF**

J. C. Frame Gets Threat by Phone and Three Times His House Found on Fire

Despite the fact that his house has been set on fire three times former Chief of Police James Frame of Highwood refuses to accept re-appointment to the force, according to stories current in that city.

It is reported there that on Sunday morning Frame, who last week tendered his resignation, received a telephone call which imparted a threat that his house would be burned and also that of the mayor if Frame did not go back on the force.

Whether the threat was in earnest or not, the fact remains that last Saturday night about 10 o'clock the house was discovered on fire on the outside, in the rear. Again on Sunday night about 9 o'clock a blaze in the rear of the house was discovered and on Tuesday night about 10:30 fire again broke out. In none of these instances was any great damage done, the flames being extinguished after scorching the boarding of the garage and side of the house and porch.

Frame, it is reported, says he will not go back on the force and at present is confining his attention to his duties as constable. The alleged incendiary attempts on his home has aroused the town and efforts are being made to trace the perpetrators.
