

NOTICE OF AWARDED CONTRACT
 NOTICE is hereby given to all persons interested, that bids for the furnishing of all labor, tools and materials necessary for the construction of a concrete pavement on Rice Street, in the City of Highland Park, County of Lake and State of Illinois, were opened on the 1st day of October, A. D. 1928, and the Highways Construction Company being the lowest responsible bidder, the contract was awarded to the said Highways Construction Company on the 5th day of October, A. D. 1928.

Said bid for the work is as follows:
 Item No. 1—700 cubic yards of excavation of the pavement, measured in the cut, including all clearing, grubbing, grading, preparing the subgrade and removal of all surplus excavated materials, shrubs and other rubbish, complete at one dollar no cents (\$1.00) per cubic yard \$ 700.00

Item No. 2—210 cubic yards of excavation of the parkways, measured in the cut, including the grading, grubbing, grading, preparing the subgrade and removal of all surplus excavated materials, shrubs and other rubbish, complete at one dollar no cents (\$1.00) per cubic yard \$ 210.00

Item No. 3—1300 square yards of a one (1) course reinforced concrete pavement, eight (8) inches thick, 1:2:4 mix, reinforced with forty-two (42) pounds of effective steel wire fabric to each one hundred (100) square feet of pavement, including all curing, protecting, cleaning and cutting the asphaltic joints flush with surface of the pavement, complete at Two dollars sixty-five cents (\$2.65) per square yard \$ 3,445.00

Item No. 4—1260 lineal feet of concrete curb, built integral with and on top of the pavement, 1:2:3 1/2 mix, including cutting, protecting, cleaning and cutting the asphaltic joints flush with the top and the face of said curb, complete at Two dollars thirty cents (\$2.30) per lineal foot \$ 2,901.00

Item No. 5—1 Catch Basin No. 1 constructed of concrete, 1:2:4 mix, inside diameter four (4) feet, the overall depth of the concrete is six and one-half (6 1/2) feet; the bottom shall be eight (8) inches thick, the wall six (6) inches thick, said Catch Basin shall be furnished with an opening for an eight (8) inch tile pipe and with a Highland Park pattern cast iron Catch Basin Cover, including all excavating, shoring, bracing, pumping, backfilling with earth, flushing and compacting said backfill and removal of all surplus excavated materials, complete at Ninety dollars no cents (\$90.00) \$ 90.00

Item No. 6—1 Catchbasin-Manhole No. 2, constructed of concrete, 1:2:4 mix, inside diameter four (4) feet, the overall depth of the concrete is seven (7) feet; the bottom shall be eight (8) inches thick, the wall six (6) inches thick, said Catchbasin Manhole shall be furnished with openings for inlet and outlet eight (8) inch tile pipe and with a Highland Park pattern cast iron Catchbasin Cover, including all excavating, shoring, bracing, pumping, backfilling with earth, flushing and compacting said backfill, and removal of all surplus excavated materials, complete at Ninety-five dollars no cents (\$95.00) \$ 95.00

Item No. 7—2 concrete Drop-Manholes No. 3 and No. 4, built over and around the existing fifteen (15) inch tile pipe across Rice Street, 1:2:4 mix, inside diameter four (4) feet; the average depth of the concrete is nine (9) feet; the bottom shall be eight (8) inches thick, the walls shall be six (6) inches thick; each Drop-Manhole shall be furnished with a Highland Park pattern cast iron Catchbasin Cover; including all excavating, shoring, bracing, pumping, backfilling with earth, flushing and compacting said backfill and removal of all surplus excavated materials, complete at Twenty-five Dollars No Cents (\$25.00) each \$ 50.00

Item No. 8—40 lineal feet of fifteen (15) inch tile pipe, double strength, for extension of existing tile pipe across Rice Street, laid on the surface of the ground in the existing ditch, with joints of mortar, 1:3 mix, including the necessary excavation for making the connections, cleaning out the existing tile pipe and connection to Headwall laid, complete at One Dollar twenty-five Cents (\$1.25) per lineal foot \$ 50.00

Item No. 9—224 lineal feet of eight (8) inch tile pipe drain, laid at an average depth of five (5) feet below the finished grade at the Center Line of the pavement, with joints of mortar, 1:3 mix, including all trenching, shoring, bracing, pumping, backfilling with earth, flushing and compacting said backfill, connections to Catch-basin, Catch-basin-manhole and Drop-manhole, laid complete at One Dollar No Cents (\$1.00) per lineal foot \$ 224.00

Item No. 10—A concrete Headwall, 1:2:4 mix, sixteen (16) feet long, six and seven tenths (6.7) feet high, top one and one quarter (1 1/4) feet below bottom two and one-half (2 1/2) feet wide, with opening for a fifteen (15) inch tile pipe; the bottom shall be three (3) feet below the flowline of said pipe; the exposed surface, to a depth of one (1) inch shall be of mortar, 1:2 mix, including all excavating, shoring, bracing, pumping, backfilling with earth, flushing and removal of all surplus excavated materials, said Headwall contains seven (7) and five tenths (7.5) cubic yards of concrete, constructed complete at Twenty Dollars No Cents (\$20.00) per cubic yard \$ 150.00

Item No. 11—5 square yards of rubble stone riprap for the slope in the ravine to the west, including eight (8) three quarter (3/4) inch round, wrought iron bars, four (4) feet long, for making a grate at the west end of the fifteen (15) inch pipe, and including a rubble stone inlet sump, two (2) feet deep, two (2) feet long and three (3) feet wide inside, constructed complete at Three Dollars No Cents (\$3.00) per square yard \$ 15.00

Item No. 12—10 square yards of macadam pavement for adjusting the existing pavement in Roger Williams Avenue where said existing pavement joins the concrete pavement in Rice Street, complete at Two Dollars Fifty Cents (\$2.50) per square yard \$ 25.00

Item No. 13—3 existing Sanitary Sewer Manhole Covers to be adjusted, complete at Ten Dollars No Cents (\$10.00) each \$ 30.00

Item No. 14—70 lineal feet of separate concrete curb, 1:2:3 1/2 mix, except that the exposed surface shall be of mortar 1:2 mix; (for details see specifications); including all excavating, backfilling with earth, flushing and compacting said backfill and removal of all surplus excavated materials, complete at Twenty Dollars No Cents (\$20.00) per lineal foot \$ 1,400.00

Item No. 15—2 core tests of the pavement to be taken to determine the thickness and crushing strength of the concrete, including the taking of said cores, delivering same at the laboratory, and the laboratory test, complete at Twenty Dollars No Cents (\$20.00) each \$ 40.00

Item No. 16—2700 square yards of Parkways, smoothed and hand-raked, lumps of earth broken up, including removal of stones and rubbish of every description, complete at No Dollars Seven Cents (\$0.07) per square yard \$ 189.00

TOTAL AMOUNT OF BID \$6,085.50

The owners of a majority of the frontage of the lots and land upon said streets, where-in said work is to be done, may, within ten days of the date hereof, elect to take said work and enter into a written contract, to do said work at ten per centum less than the price at which the same has been awarded.

LOCAL RED CROSS GETS APPEAL FOR STORM AID
Relief Needed for Sufferers in West Indies and Florida; Is Urgent

There is immediate need for relief in the West Indies following the devastating hurricane of last week and the American National Red Cross has appealed for voluntary contributions to the relief program, according to Mrs. William Frye, chairman of Lake Forest committee of the Red Cross.

"The Red Cross has given \$50,000 and dispatched expert disaster relief workers to Porto Rico," Mrs. Frye said. "Tone of foodstuffs, clothing and supplies have also been shipped to the islands. However, this is only a small start since the preliminary survey made in the islands show need of a large relief fund such has been the heavy losses in life and property."

President Coolidge on Saturday requested that the Red Cross take charge of the relief program in the islands and at the same time placed at the organization's disposal any and all naval craft necessary to transport workers and supplies to the relief of the sufferers.

Contributions to the relief fund should be sent to Chicago chapter, American National Red Cross, 616 S. Michigan avenue, Mrs. Frye said. They will then be transferred to Washington in a lump sum.

SUSPENDS APPLICATION FOR INCREASED RATES

The Illinois State Commerce Commission has suspended until November 24, the application of the Illinois Light and Power Co., to revise the rates for heating at Decatur, Clinton, Danville, Bloomington and Urbana.

The commission has also suspended until the same date the application of the Illinois Southwest Telephone Co., to increase its rates for service at Shelbyville, Oakland, Mattoon, Tower Hill, Ashmore and Charles-ton.

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
