

ILLINOIS FOOTBALL SCHEDULE FOR FALL

NORTHWESTERN ON OCT. 27

Five Home Games at Champaign on List; Indiana First Time Since 1924 on Oct. 20; Other Games

University of Illinois football fans will be provided with a colorful home program. Five contests are scheduled for here including three with Big Ten rivals and two college elevens of high calibre.

Northwestern holds a prominent place as the homecoming guest of October 27, and Indiana will furnish the opposition on October 20, Dad's Day. The third conference game at home is the finale with Ohio State on November 24.

Northwestern is coming to Illinois for the first time since 1922, when the Zuppen defeated the Wildcats 6-3 in old Illinois field. Since then Illinois and Northwestern have met twice—in 1923 when Grange ran wild against the Purple at Chicago and last season when the Illini secured a 7 to 6 decision at Evanston. This was the only time the championship Illini were behind in the scoring during a conference game.

Game With Indiana This year's meeting with Indiana marks the first game between the two teams since 1914, and advance information from the Hoosier camp that they have the best prospects in years gives promise of a real scrap. This will be the first Big Ten game for Illinois. Pat Page, the Hoosier coach, played against Illini grid and baseball teams seventeen years ago as a student at Chicago.

The rivalry of Illinois and Ohio football teams has become a tradition, and that this year's game will be a feature requires no explanation. Ohio's appearance here will be the last Illinois meeting with a Wilce-coached Ohio eleven because the Buckeye mentor will retire at the end of the season.

The Illini open October 6 against Bradley Tech of Peoria, one of the leading college teams of the middle-west. The following week-end, Coe college of Cedar Rapids, Iowa, will appear here.

The first out-of-town game comes on November 3 against Michigan at Ann Arbor. November 10 will find the Zuppen playing in the dedication game for the new Butler stadium at Indianapolis. A game with Chicago on November 17 winds up the road trips.

BIG BUILDING GAIN IN 9 MONTHS HERE

Chicago Heights 349 per cent, Niles Center 266 per cent, Lake Forest 250 per cent, Lombard 228 per cent, Joliet 191 per cent, Kenilworth 168 per cent, Mount Prospect 167 per cent, Wheaton 154 per cent, Elmhurst 153 per cent and Highland Park 113 per cent.

For Nine Months If it had not been for an \$8,000,000 loss in Gary the nine months comparison would have been practically even with last year. In thirty-five comparative suburbs the total building for the first three quarters of this year amounted to \$83,130,291 compared with \$91,106,073 for the same period in 1927, indicating a loss of 8 per cent.

The largest gains for the three-quarters period this year compared with last year were as follows: Kenilworth 162 per cent, Chicago Heights 110 per cent, La Grange 66 per cent and Wilmette 65 per cent.

Other gains were made in the following suburbs: Aurora, Elmhurst, Elmwood Park, Glen Ellyn, Harvey, Highland Park, Joliet, Lake Forest, Maywood, Mount Prospect, Niles Center, Oak Park, River Forest, East Chicago, Hammond and Whiting.

It is significant, according to the Straus survey, that this remarkable building program in the metropolitan area has been accomplished with great scientific improvements in construction technique and with a minimum of difficulty, misunderstanding or loss caused by differences between contractors and building trades craftsmen.

ROAD BUILDING COST IN UNITED STATES

An estimate issued by the American Automobile Association places the probable outlay for highway construction in the United States this year at \$1,360,925,776, which is almost \$12 for every man, woman and child in the Nation. Thus the amount spent on the highways alone exceeds the entire appropriations of the United States Government in that day when Thomas B. Reid, speaker of the house of representatives, met the complaints of the people because congress had appropriated more than a billion dollars to carry on the government for a year, with the retort: "This is a billion dollar country!"

The report of the Corporation Counsel on complaints with reference to the alleged zoning ordinance violation by Paul Borchardt was ordered placed on file and the City Clerk directed to write the complainants giving them the substance of said report.
