Press Wanted Ads Bring Results

PRINTING TELEGRAPH AIDS TRANSMISSION

SPEEDS COMMUNICATION

Telephone Typewriter Used in Press Services Improves Quality and Is More Economical

By means of the printing telegraph service, or the telephone typewriter as it is coming to be known, instant transmission of communications between distant offices, factories, etc., is made available, providing each connected unit of the organization with typewritten copies simultaneously.

First Used in 1917 The telephone typewriter service was first used in 1927 by one of the large press associations whose exacting requirements it met admirably, but recently it has been adapted to other commercial users and particularly to large industries having a widespread organization.

As one feature of the program involving the new communication system of the New York City Police Department, a telephone typewriter switching system has been installed which provides communication between General Police Headquarters, Manhattan, and all the borough police headquarters and to all the Manhattan precincts, also from each of the four borough headquarters outside of Manhattan to each precinct station in that borough and to other strategic points.

This service was officially turned over to the Police Department by the New York Telephone Company, Mayor Walker sending the opening message in the presence of President McCulloh and other telephone and police officials. The following day a stolen truck containing \$10,000 worth of merchandise was recovered forty-five minutes after its loss was reported, through a description sent to all precincts in Manhattan by the aid of this system.

Is Selective The system is arranged so that an operator at headquarters may send from a keyboard to any one precinct, to any group, or simultaneously to all precincts, the messages being printed automatically in page form at the receiving machines, which are placed close to the desk of the officer in charge of the precinct. A signal lamp is associated with each line so that the receipt of a message may be acknowledged by each station. Lines are also provided for incoming messages from the headquarters in the other four boroughs.

Telephone typewriter service is also being furnished on a somewhat smaller scale to the police departments in St. Louis and Boston, and to twelve cities in Connecticut whose police headquarters are interconnected.

CHILDREN'S HOME AND AID SOCIETY BENEFITS

Many Local People Interested in Work of Charitable Organization

Many Highland Park people are interested in the Illinois Children's Home and Aid Society, and in order that its operation may be better understood by more widely appreciated locally the following brief outline of its work is given here:

The Illinois Children's Home and Aid society is the only agency of its kind in the state. For forty-five years, without interruption it has been receiving and caring for homeless and neglected children from every county. Age, color or nationality does not debar them from service. It has accepted the legal guardianship with all the responsibilities incident thereto of over 10,600 children, and has under daily care in its institutions, boarding homes, and private families, a family of over 1,800 children who depend upon it for their opportunity in life.

It has adopted present day and scientific methods in dealing with these children.

While its general offices are in Chicago, it has branch offices in other sections and trained technicians located at various points so that there is not a child in the entire state remote from or ineligible to such service as the society is able to give children who are in trouble.

While it began its service specifically as a home finding agency, it soon discovered that conditions of misery and distress leading to child neglect and abuse are frequently curable and preventable.

It has therefore been a factor in the development of a new science. The social worker in the service of the society today is a diagnostician whose business it is to know how to improve the conditions in the child's home without removing him from his brothers and sisters and relieving the family of their responsibility.

The Illinois Children's Home and Aid society last year served over 2,000 children in this manner in addition to caring for its daily population of 1,800 children.

Because of the nature of the work there is little in the way of visible equipment. The Evanston Receiving home is financed entirely by members of the North Shore Advisory board largely from Evanston and

vicinity. This receiving home together with a smaller but similar institution at Duquoin in southern Illinois, is used simply for receiving purposes. They are not "Children's Homes" or "Orphanages." The children there receive intensive physical observation and treatment; leading physicians in Evanston and Chicago give their service without compensation to this end. The children are retained in the receiving homes only for a brief period of time and are transferred from there either to their own families or into foster homes.

LOAN ASSOCIATIONS IN STATE SHOW BIG GAINS

Report of State Auditor Indicates Notable Growth in Past Year

Annual report of Oscar Nelson, state auditor, shows that building and loan associations of Illinois increased their resources approximately \$32,600,000 during the past fiscal year. The report shows a total of 929 associations of this character operating in the state, of which 491 are located in downstate cities and owns and 438 in Cook county.

In December 1927 the 910 associations then in operation in the state had resources of \$338,097,831.34, of which the 489 downstate associations had \$275,428,335.74, an increase of \$26,507,235.58 over the previous year, and the 431 Cook county associations showed an increase of \$6,081,295.05.

The increase shown in the downstate section is regarded as remarkable considering the adverse conditions in the farming districts and the mining sections of the state, together with the reverses suffered in other sections due to floods and high water.

With one or two exceptions, every city in Illinois, and many of the towns and villages, support building and loan associations. Chicago with

351 heads the list. Other cities in Illinois having five or more associations are:

Cicero, 29; Springfield, 14; Peoria, 8; Berwyn, 7; Alton, 6; Belleville, 6; Cairo, 6; Danville, 6; East St. Louis, 6; and Champaign, 5.

ANCESTRAL CRAFT IN MUSEUM EXHIBIT

INTEREST TO BOAT FANS

Specimens From All Countries From Eskimo Kayak to Egyptian and Melanesian Vessels

For the yachtsman and "boat fan" who is interested in the fundamentals and history of water craft design and construction, there are many interesting exhibits in various sections of the department of anthropology at Field Museum of Natural History. In the Egyptian collection there is an ancient boat, built 4,500 years ago, and one of the five oldest boats existing anywhere in the world, so far as is known. Its lines have been pronounced by authorities on marine architecture as rivaling those of a modern yacht. There are also two models of Egyptian galleys, which were used as mortuary figures in tombs, on display.

Eskimo Kayak

In the Eskimo collection a full-sized kayak used for hunting is shown, containing a life-size cast of an Eskimo man, with spear poised to hurl at a seal or other animal. A model of an extremely interesting vessel is shown in the hall of African ethnology—an ancient war canoe of Duala, Cameroon, manned by eighteen tribesmen. The prow of the canoe has an elaborately carved wooden figurehead which has a legen-

dary significance. The men with the paddles in such canoes are kept in unison by the beating of a drum in the stern, the drummer corresponding to the coxswain of a college crew. mu-cum ethnologists declare.

In the museum's Polynesian collection are models of an outrigger fishing canoe from the Marshall Islands, and another type of outrigger from Matty Island. Two models of boats used by the Batak tribesmen of North Central Sumatra are shown in an adjoining hall. Among the exhibits from Melanesia are elaborately carved prows of dugout canoes used by the natives of the north coast of New Guinea, representing the heads of crocodiles. Some of these are simply grotesque, others are quite lifelike representations of the creatures. They were used on canoes navigating the Sepik River.

Unusual Dugout

Another Melanesian type is shown in a model of an unusual dugout, the sides of which have been raised with planking, the fastenings being of rattan. Because of its height, without compensating draft, this type is necessarily an outrigger. It is from Karriet Island. From Formosa the museum has a model of a native dugout which in lines and shape closely resembles the birch-bark canoes of North American Indians. Its sides are carved with representations of human figures, and artistic geometric designs. In the collection of Peruvian and Colombian pottery are some clever representations in China of native types of boats.
