SEEK DAM SITE IN FOX RIVER VALLEY

VARIOUS PLANS OFFERED

Effort Being Made to Overcome Objections to Construction of Another Obstruction in River

Congressmen, was department engineers and Fox river valley civic leaders toured the McHenry river and lakes region via motor launch last week in a survey of sites proposed for a new dam across the Fox river.

Led by Congressman Frank R. Reid of the eleventh congressional district, the party, starting at McHenry, boarded a launch and spent an entire afternoon cruising through the riverlakes region. Other members of the party included: Congressman McDonald of Chicago, Colonel Weeks of the war department and two department engineers; William J. Stratton of Waukegan, Mayor Peter Frett of McHenry, Charles W. Renich of Woodstock, C. M. Buel and T. J. Schmitz, both of Elgin. The latter two represented Edward N. Herbster, president of the Elgin sanitary district, on the inspection tour.

Protests Voiced

Some months ago agitation to conriver resulted in a veritable flood work. of protest from downriver communities who charged that such construction would spell low water, hinder sanitation and industry, and threaten health of valley cities. At that time it was proposed to construct the dam just above McHenry, but opponents of the plan countered with the suggestion to rebuild the present McHegry

A state appropriation put through for the dam will soon run out unless a plan is definitely decided upon and this afternoon's tour of the river is for the purpose of considering the situation first-hand and then presenting possible recommendations.

One of the latest proposals to be made provides for the construction of a dam across Nippersink creek, thus backing up the water and producing a new lake in the region north of McHenry.

LIBERTYVILLE VOTES FOR BIGGER H. SCHOOL

Plan to Issue Bonds to Enlarge Building Approved; Begin Preliminaries

The People of Libertyville township went on record recently as favoring the enlargement of the local high school and by a vote of 345 to 237 sanctioned the issuance of bonds amounting to \$100,000 to provide funds for the construction of the addition to the present building.

The vote on the proposition which was taken at a special election held Saturday afternoon, was the heaviest ever polled on a school matter, a total of 590 votes being cast when the polls closed at seven o'clock.

The proposed improvement consists of the erection of a two story structure at the north and east of the present building, the new part to house a modern gymnasium and a number of class rooms to relieve the present congestion.

A meeting of the school board was held and plans were made for the promotion of the work. It was decided to advertise immediately for the sale of the bonds which are expected to bring more than par on competitive, bidding.

WAUKEGAN SECOND CITY IN STATE IN BUILDING

September Reports Shows It Is Outstripped Only By Chicago Record

Waukegan was outstripped only by the city of Chicago in the value of building permits issued during the month of September, in the cities of Illinois, according to the report issued by the bureau of labor and statistics

of the state today. With a total of \$872,970, Waukegan led all downstate and suburban cities as well for the month. Rockford was second among downstate cities with \$857,609 of which \$340,-000 was expended for repairs on buildings damaged by the tornado. Oak Park led the suburban cities in the Chicago district with a total of \$689,949 which was far below that of Waukegan's total. The figure shows a big gain for Waukegan as the total value of building for the same month in 1927 was but \$203,774.

Leads in Residences

Waukegan also leads all other downstate cities for the value of permits for residences issued during the month, the total value of permits of this kind being \$265,500. Rockford again is second, but much of the building was to replace storm wrecked structures. Peoria was third among the downstate cities with a total or \$172,400.

Waukegan is also among the leaders for the volume of building for the present year. The total volume o building for this period in Wankegan is \$2,996,083, as against \$5,795,091, the figure for the same period of 1927.
