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HEARS ARGUMENT ON INJUNCTION CASE

Arguments on an injunction filed by H. O. Stone company, Chicago land brokers, to halt more than 100 buyers of land in a subdivision near Highland Park and Lake Bluff from getting the right to rescind their contracts, were made last week before Circuit Judge C. C. Edwards.

These defendants had sued in Chicago to get their down payments back and the company, acting as sales agents for the trustees, filed the injunction here to prevent clouding of titles, attorneys said.

It was argued that the court did not have jurisdiction as all the contract holders resided outside of the county. In behalf of H. O. Stone it was pointed out that as the property was in Lake county that Cook county judgments would only be on the person and not on the land.

Considerable money is involved, it is said, as the land is located in the rich Skokie Valley. The matter was taken under advisement.

HEARS BUSICK WANTED IN MISSOURI FRAUD

State's Attorney Gets Workman Indicted Here Is Sought in Sullivan, Mo.

Caleb A. Busick, former Waukegan real estate dealer, who is under indictment in Lake county on a charge of conspiracy to embezzle \$100,000 from the county treasury, is wanted in Sullivan county, Missouri, State Attorney A. V. Smith was informed last week. He is charged with conspiracy to defraud in a warrant issued in the Missouri county recently.

Col. Smith was informed by the state's attorney of Sullivan county that a search is being made in and around Chicago for Busick, but so far efforts to locate him have been futile. He is under bond of \$10,000 on the Lake county charge.

An attorney from Missouri conferred with Col. Smith about the charge against Busick here some weeks ago. He said that Busick was alleged to have been involved in a county treasury swindle there.
