

MECHANICAL BRAIN IS NEW TRAFFIC DIRECTOR

Notable Device Being Tried Out in New Haven, Conn.; Is Unique

Evidence that electricity may solve the nation's traffic problem is found

Involving a far greater number of variations than the automatic telephone or the recently perfected televox, this device known as electromatic control, directs the movement of traffic with an uncanny intelligence. it arises.

Automobiles approaching the intersection when no cross traffic is moving are given the green light instantly. Should an automobile appear on the cross street immediately after the first cars have passed, the lights immediately flash back again. Vehicles are never compelled to wait when the intersection is open for passage.

When no cross traffic is present long lines of vehicles are given a continuous right of way except for brief intervals now and then to allow pedestrians safe passage.

Contacts, set in the pavement, about 65 feet from the crossing, act as the "senses" of the system and when vehicles pass send impulses to the control box on the corner. The control box co-ordinate the impulses and meets every traffic situation as
