PLAN TO EXTEND MAIL DELIVERY HERE SOON

Postmaster Authorized to Give Service and Is Working Out System

Postmaster Hugo Schneider announced that he has been authorized to extend the mail delivery system locally after several months of effort and correspondence with postal authorities at Washington. The new territory to be served by carrier, after certain preliminaries demanded by the postal department are complied with, includes Sunset Terrace and Ross subdivisions on the west and Bartlett's subdivision, south of Ridgewood drive to the County line and east to Green Bay road and also Braeside and the territory east of the Northwestern railroad from the end of the present delivery system limits south to County line.

While plans are not worked out, it is expected to begin this delivery in about six weeks by mounted carrier, and door delivery will given once a day if conditions are complied with.

No delivery can be given unless street signs and house numbers are in place in all parts of the territory to be served, and receptacles for the mail must also be provided by the householders. It is absolutely necessary that these conditions be met with before mail will be delivered. Patrons in this territory may obtain this service when established by making application to the postmaster. There is nothing compulsory about it, and if they prefer to get their mail at the post office they have been using, they need not change this custom.

This may result in very serious accidents, and I am sure that as soon as the matter is called to the attention of the drivers, they will refrain from such conduct. A great many children are now on the bridge paths, and they are very often unable to control their horses when the horses are frightened.
