**GREEN BAY ROAD PAVEMENT OPENED**

days the cement work was completed as far as the roadway was concerned. This job required about 24,000 square yards of cement at an average thickness of 10 1/2 inches, about a half-inch more than the contract calls for. Excavation of 12,000 cubic yards of earth was necessary before the pavement was begun. The contract price was \$111,478.60, and the job was done with dispatch and efficiency and the improvement is a notable addition to the street system of Highland Park.

Winds & Marsh are the engineers in charge, with Philip E. Cole as resident engineer and William Schultz as inspector. V. Campagni was foreman on the job for the E. A. Meyer construction Co.

**Same for South End**

With the completion of the fine pavement in North Green Bay, attention necessarily turns at once to the south end of the street, and it is urged that the city get busy immediately in preparation for improving that portion of South Green Bay from Stipe's corner to Roger Williams avenue. It is pointed out that the property owners on this section of the road have never been assessed for its construction or maintenance by any special assessment, and as the road is narrow and in bad condition, the need for its improvement is urgent. If condition hampers traffic and delays progress, the city administration is urged to begin plans at once looking to the improvement of this road, in order that traffic through Highland Park may not be hampered and congested.

It may be argued that Highland Park is not interested in through traffic, but the fact remains that through traffic must and will continue to pass over the city streets on these through routes in ever increasing volume, and it must be taken care of in order to prevent congestion and inconvenience to local traffic.

**Narrow Viaduct**

There is also urgent need, it is pointed out, for the widening of the Chicago & Northwestern viaduct at this point, as this is the natural outlet for the newly widened section of North Green Bay road. The North Shore Line viaduct was constructed much wider than the Northwestern section, and hence the latter presents a bottle neck, through which heavy Bay traffic must pass. It is very necessary that this narrow viaduct should be widened adequately at once, now that the widened Green Bay road will bring increased traffic, and the city administration is urged to do such things as may be necessary to meet this improvement for the public good.

The concrete footings for the building extend deep into the ground almost to the level of the bottom of the neighboring ravine.

No change is contemplated by Mr. Cushing in the present dining room and kitchen arrangements, as they are already considered ample to take care of the increased space, maintaining the excellent service for which the Moraine always has been noted.

**Fifth Unit of Plant**

The new building is the fifth which has been added to the Moraine hotel property since the original structure was finished in 1906. During the past year a large central heating plant was completed. It is a fireproof structure wholly isolated from all the other buildings and has ample heating capacity for all the buildings, including the new north annex.

Oil has been used as fuel for heating the hotel buildings for the past two years, with great success, and it is not a pound of coal is being consumed on the premises for its purpose.

**Future Development**

It is understood that if conditions justify the outlay, it is planned to add one new building each year to the hotel group until a total capacity of 700 or 800 rooms is reached, which will make the Moraine one of the largest and finest residence hotels in the country outside of the larger cities.

**SENTENCE TWO TO DEATH IN LAKE COUNTY MURDER**

John Brown, 32 years old, colored, 3652 Indiana avenue, Chicago, and Cominck Brestette, 33 years old, a Chippewa Indian chief from the La Pointe, Wis., reservation, were found guilty of murder by a jury in the court of Circuit Judge Claire C. Edwards at Waukegan and their punishment fixed at death in the electric chair. The last execution in Lake county was in 1873. The jury deliberated 45 minutes.

Brown and Brestette were charged along with three others, Claude Clark, Harold Martin, and George Boone, Chicago negroes, with having murdered William Beck, 34 years old, a farmer at Milburn, on the night of May 16 when he resisted them in their attempt to rob the home. Clark pleaded guilty to murder, admitting that he fired the fatal shot.
